Since its establishment in 1992, IHH Humanitarian Relief Foundation has continued to operate with the aim of delivering humanitarian aid needed by people in dire situations and preventing the violation of their fundamental rights and freedoms anywhere in the world. IHH provides humanitarian aid to people living in impoverished conditions, those affected by wars or natural disasters, and those who have been victims of violence.

While operating in the axis of humanitarian relief, human rights and humanitarian diplomacy, IHH also promotes the idea of helping others, solidarity and friendship in Türkiye and across the world by developing many social and cultural projects as it continues its operations. IHH assumes the duty of a pioneer and a role model in the development of NGOs that operate in regions experiencing hardship and victimization. In addition to emergency aid, IHH also takes part in the construction of sustainable projects including schools, orphanages, mosques, water wells, cultural centers, health clinics and hospitals to serve the people in these regions and contribute to the development of the countries. IHH also acts as a mediator in solving issues using humanitarian diplomacy in all regions where people are victimized, and international diplomacy is inadequate.

Honored with the Outstanding Service Award by the Grand National Assembly of Türkiye in 2007, IHH Humanitarian Relief Foundation has been granted tax exemption and classified as a foundation working for public benefit as per Cabinet Decree 2011/1799 of 04.04.2011.

IHH Humanitarian Relief Foundation has a consultative status member of the United Nations Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC) and the Organization of Islamic Cooperation (OIC); a council member of the Organization for Islamic Cooperation Humanitarian Fund (OICHF) and a member of the Humanitarian Forum (THF); International Council of Voluntary Agencies (ICVA); Turkish Volunteer Organizations Foundation (TGTV) and the Union of NGOs of the Islamic World (IDSB).

For over 25 years, IHH Humanitarian Relief Foundation has aimed to spread kindness globally and consistently. 

A LETTER FROM OUR SECRETARY-GENERAL

In 2022, despite the lifting of coronavirus measures and restrictions worldwide, the economic fallout was still being felt, particularly in poorer countries. Ongoing war, occupation, and human rights abuses persisted, resulting in fatalities from drought and malnutrition. However, IHH increased its aid capacity and sectors, supporting millions of people in need, as it does every year. IHH maintained its commitment to transparency, trust, and justice, ensuring that all its activities and projects adhered to these fundamental principles.

In 2022, IHH was involved in various sectors, including food security and livelihoods, non-food, education, protection, health, water, sanitation and hygiene, shelter, cultural and disaster management. Along with this, IHH also engaged in activities related to human rights and advocacy, humanitarian diplomacy, and international relations. It established relationships and organized meetings with other organizations in the same field, while also strengthening its inter-departmental relations and enhancing its internal capacity.

IHH has provided assistance to families in need within our country and has helped over 1.8 million people across 177 different projects. Additionally, it has provided humanitarian aid to support those affected by the ongoing conflict in Ukraine, and have provided health support, water, and food aid to combat drought in the Horn of Africa. The organization has also continued its advocacy work, as well as its efforts in education and other humanitarian aid initiatives for Palestine, Syria, Arakan, and East Turkestan.

Our goal for 2023 is to enhance our capacity and competence across all areas. While we were able to respond to the earthquake that occurred earlier this year with over 7,000 professional and volunteer teams, we are committed to further improving our search and rescue capabilities. Furthermore, we will continue to provide assistance to those in need, prioritizing our efforts in our own country, as well as in other crisis-stricken regions.

On behalf of the IHH staff, I would like to express our endless gratitude to all of our donors, volunteers, and supporters who have placed their trust in us and contributed to our mission of spreading goodness throughout the world.

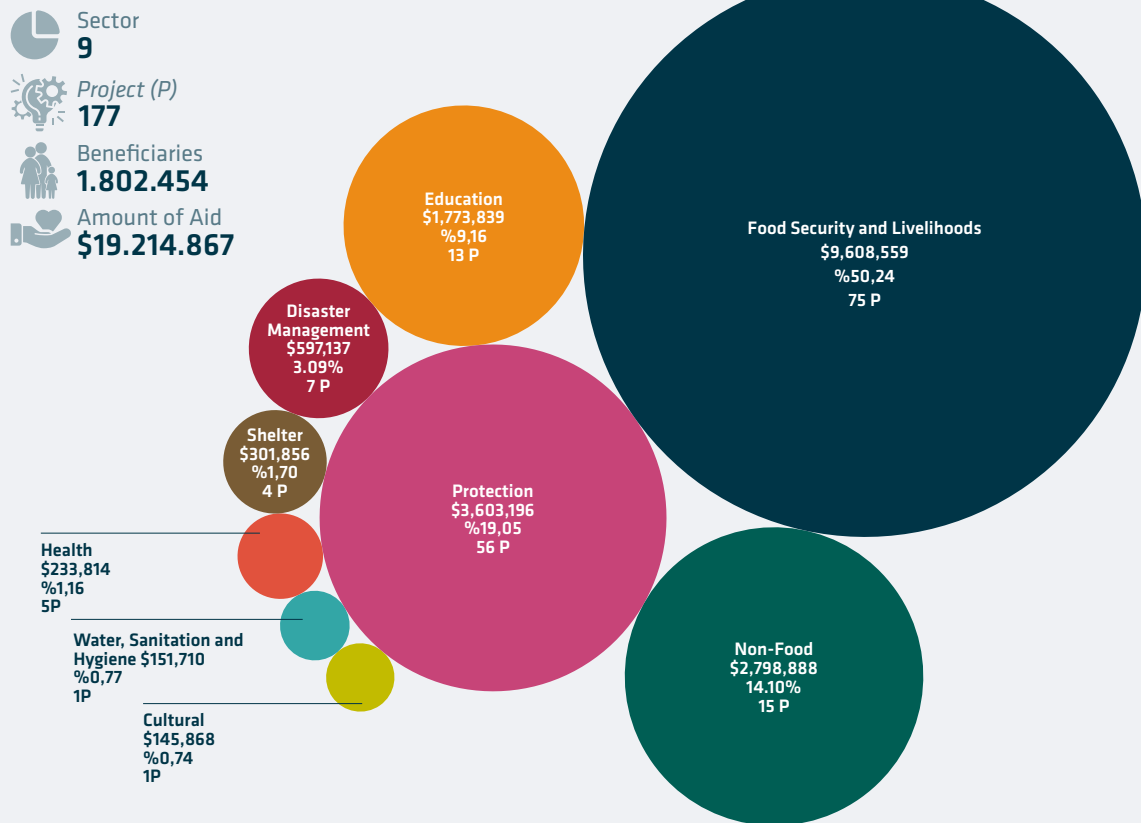


DONATION ACTIVITIES BY YEAR



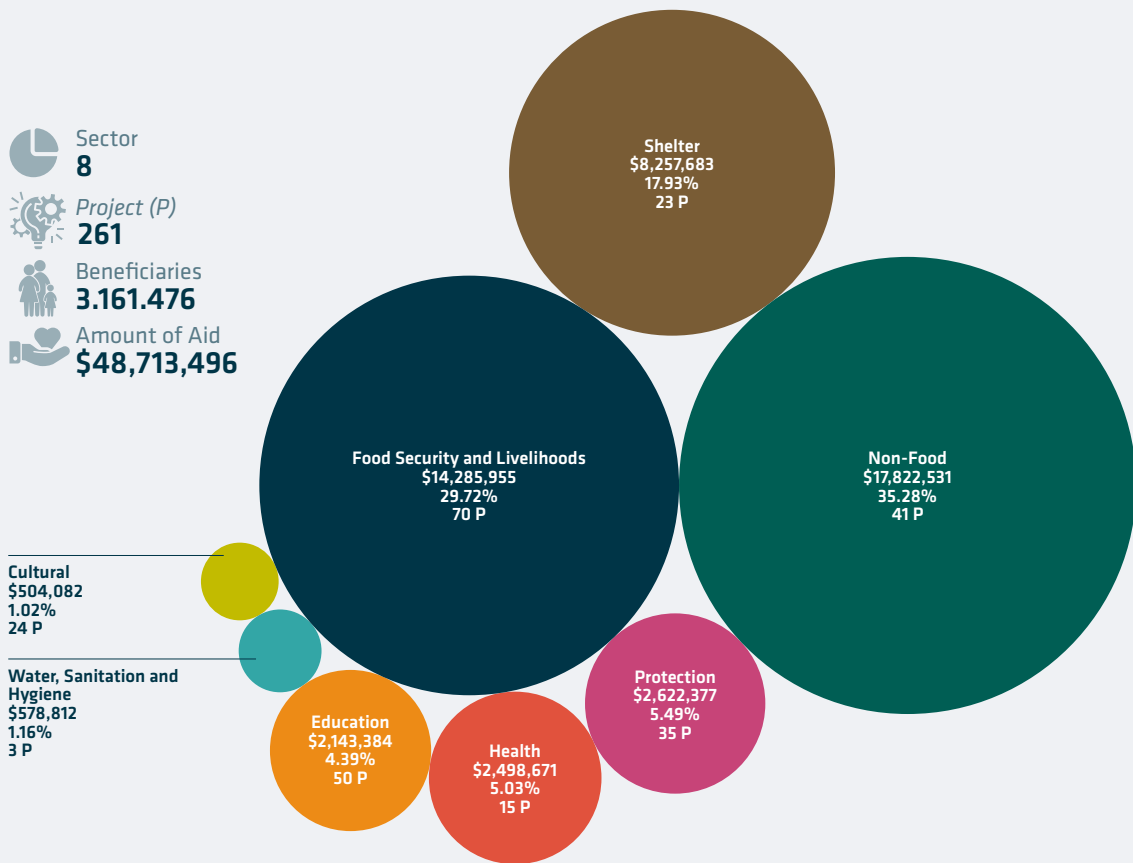
Türkiye

Our organization aims to provide aid to those in need in our country while upholding the trust that our donors have placed in us. We have successfully implemented a variety of projects, with a particular focus on distributing food parcels and Qurbani shares, as well as providing non-food aid, education, and support for orphans. In 2022, we were able to positively impact more than 1.8 million people in need across all aid sectors through the successful implementation of 177 projects within our country.



Syria

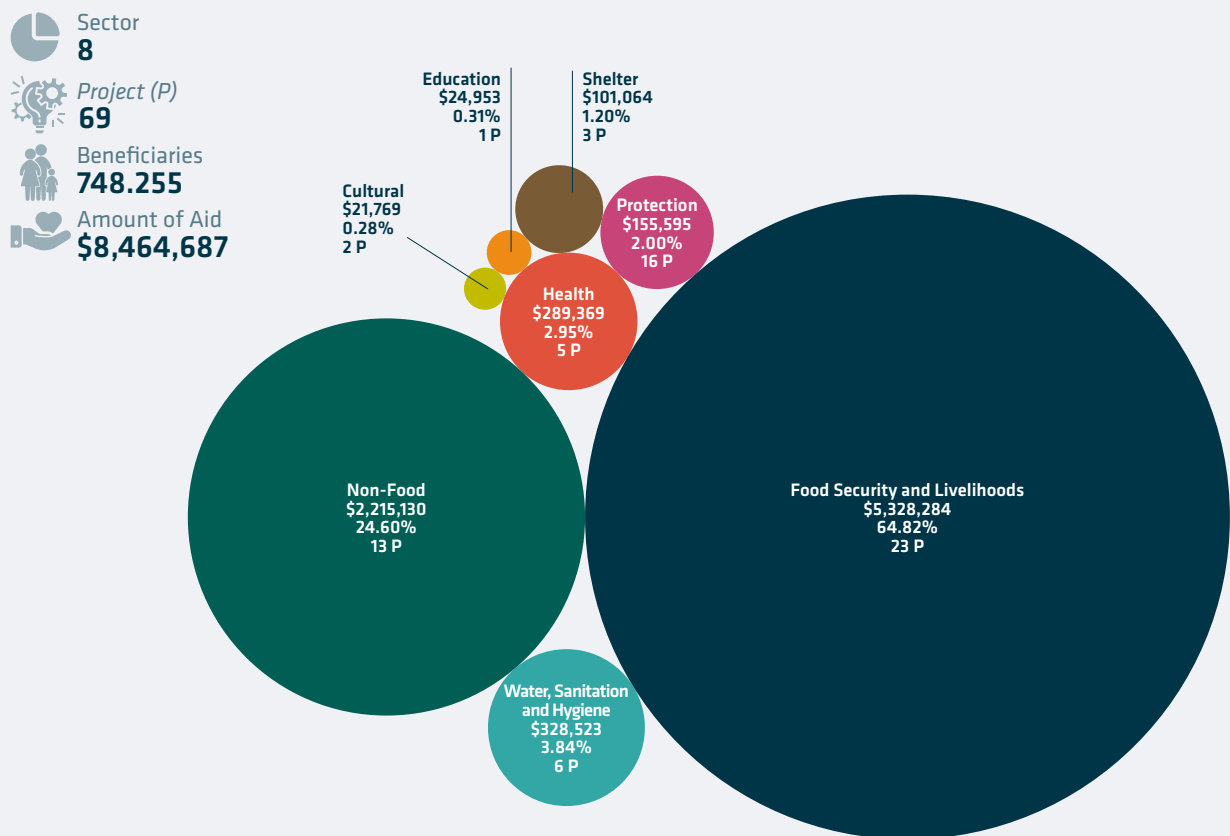
Hundreds of thousands of people have lost their lives in Syria's civil war, which began in 2011. 12.3 million people have left the country, while 6.7 million have been internally displaced. We have been working since the beginning of the war to meet needs such as food, shelter, education, health, and clothing in a country where 14.6 million people still require humanitarian assistance. We lessen the impact of the war on people through the permanent projects we implement. We provided humanitarian assistance to over 3 million people in Syria in 2022.



Afghanistan

The war in Afghanistan, which has lasted for over 40 years, has made it difficult for people to access basic needs. Hospitals, schools, madrasahs, universities, and mosques have become unusable due to the war. Nearly 2 million children were orphaned as a result.

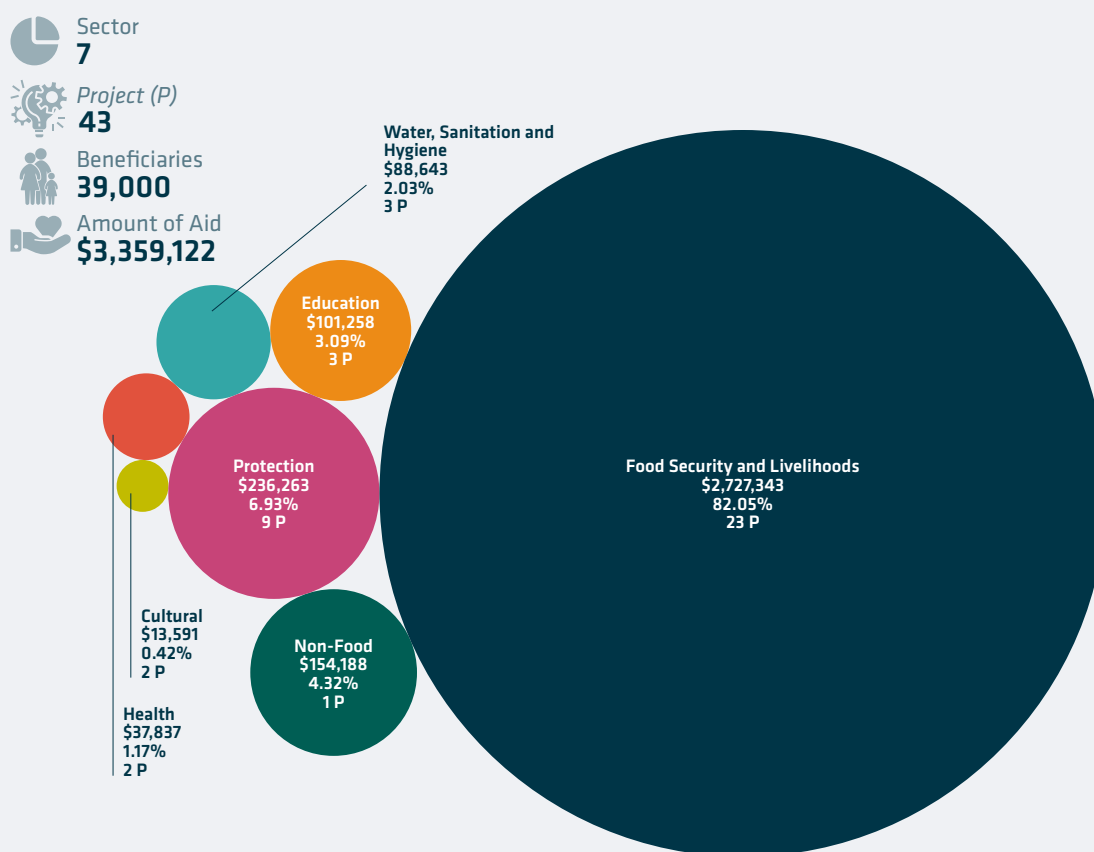
We continue our work in food security and non-food aid materials, as well as in the water, sanitation, and hygiene sectors. In 2022, 748 thousand people in need benefited from 69 projects we carried out in Afghanistan.



Somalia

Insufficient rainfall in Somalia has caused the most severe drought in the past 40 years, making it difficult for people to access basic necessities. Due to agricultural problems, 6.7 million people are struggling with hunger. In 2022, 836 thousand people had to leave their homes to survive. Millions of people cannot access clean water.

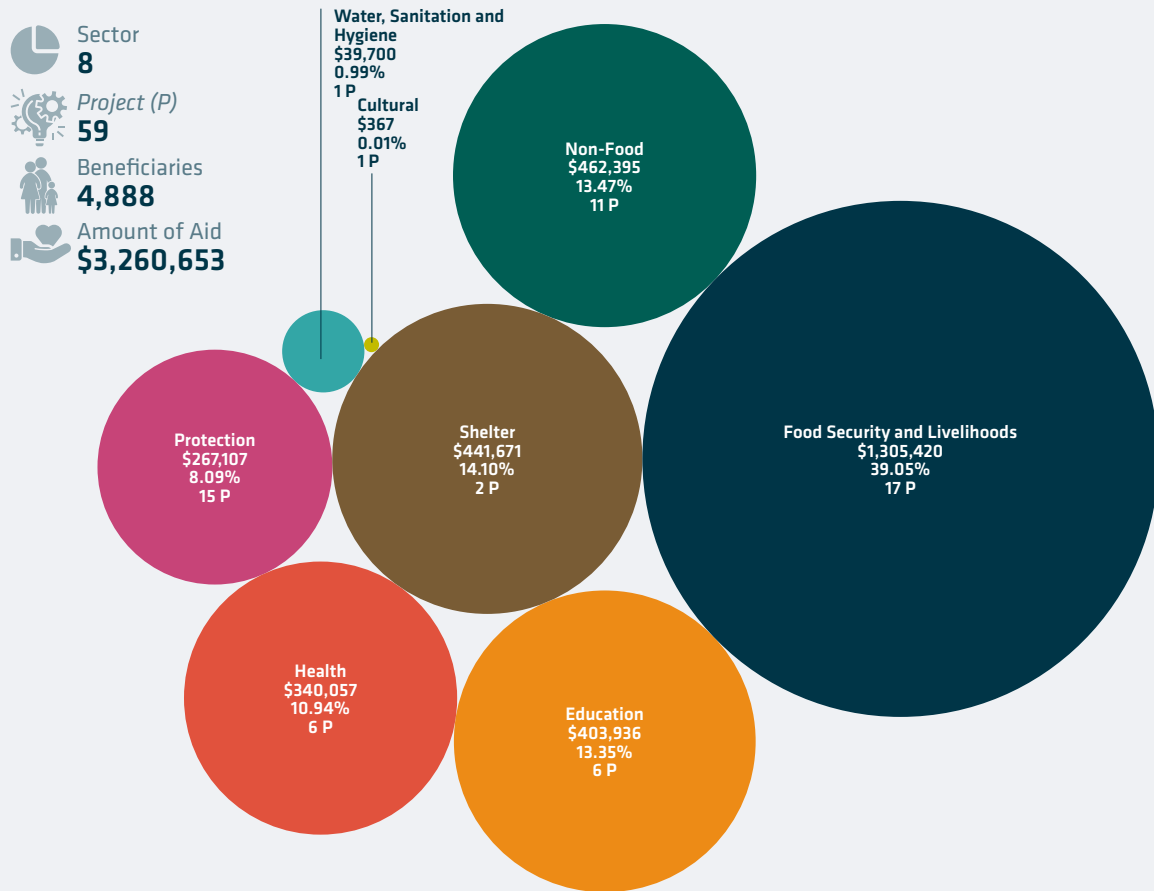
We have prioritized emergency aid projects, particularly food aid, for the people of Somalia. In 2022, we reached 513 thousand people with 43 projects.



Palestine

The situation in Palestine has been challenging since the Israeli occupation in 1948, and the blockade in Gaza has left hundreds of thousands of people without basic necessities.

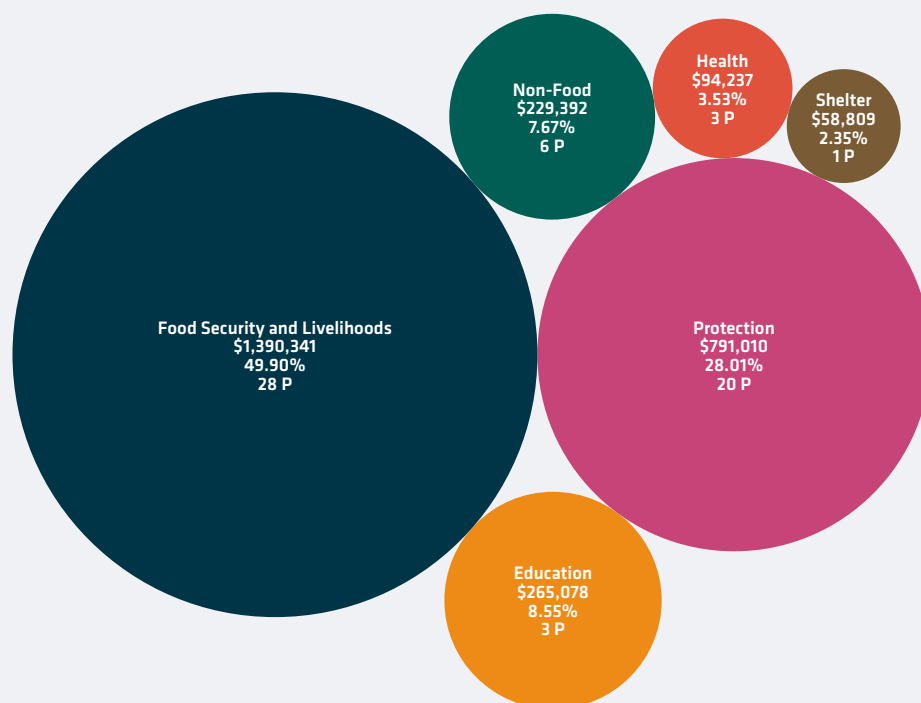
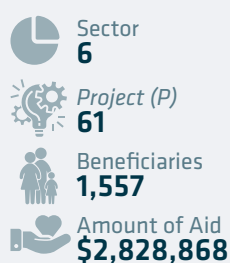
Despite these difficulties, we have been working in Gaza for many years and have provided assistance to hundreds of thousands of people. In 2022, our efforts in food, education, health, shelter, and other areas helped 678 thousand people in Gaza.



Yemen

Yemen's drought and seven-year civil war have exacerbated the water crisis, leaving almost 18 million people without access to clean water. The drought has also damaged agricultural land. According to the United Nations, 3.3 million people have left their homes and migrated to other regions.

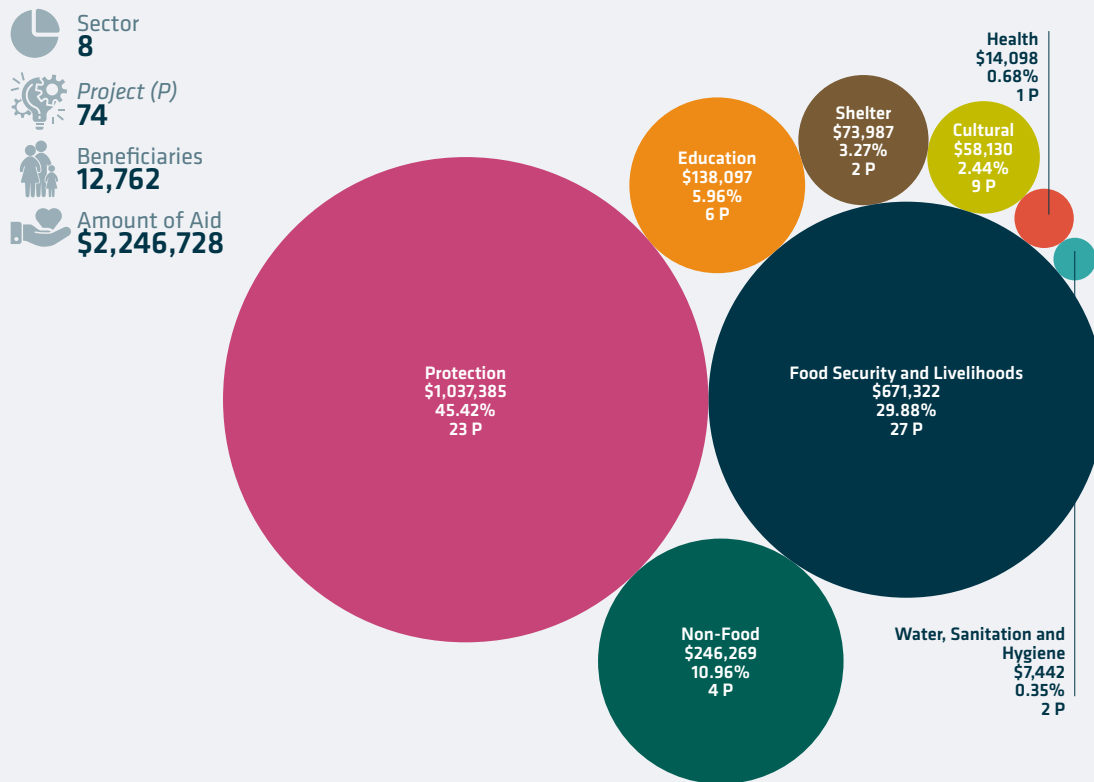
We work on projects to support orphans and their families and provide food and education to those who are suffering from the drought and conflicts in Yemen. In 2022, we were able to reach 265 thousand people through 61 projects.



Sudan

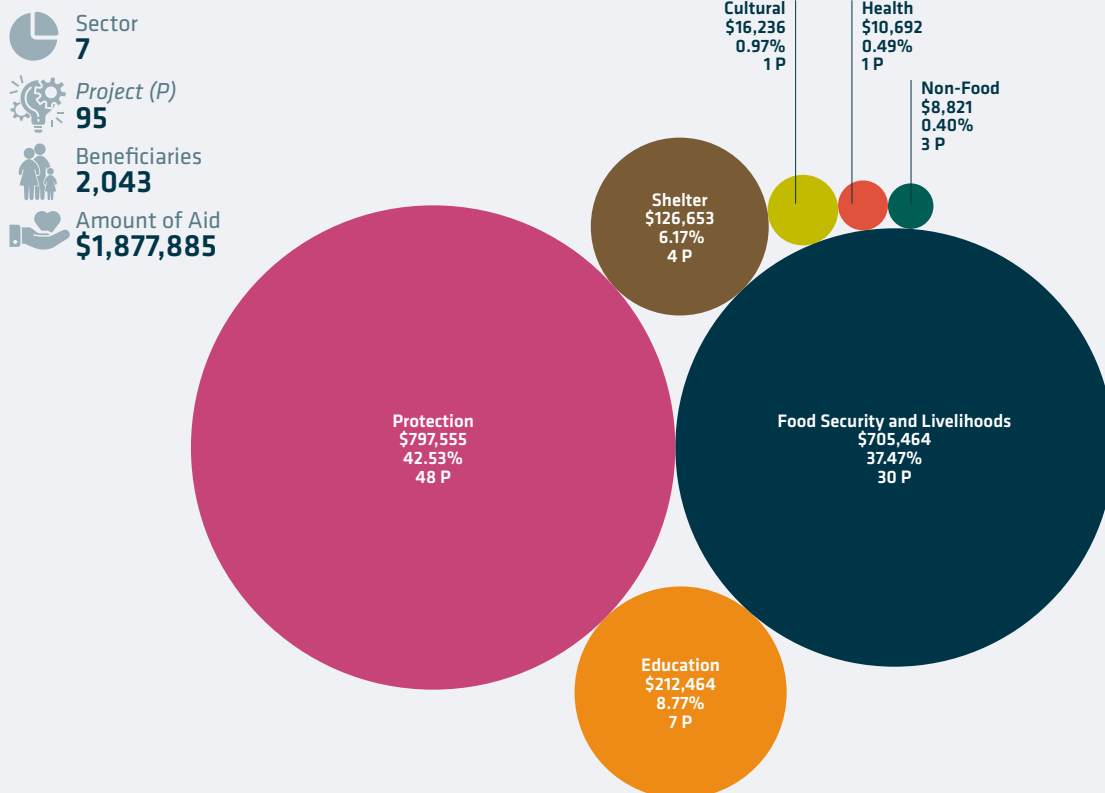
Years of instability in Sudan and the secession of South Sudan have caused many people to require humanitarian aid. This crisis has led to the displacement of 3.7 million people within the country. In 2022, almost 300 thousand people had to flee their homes. Over 15 million people lack sufficient access to food.

Moreover, refugees who have migrated to Sudan from Ethiopia due to conflict still have urgent needs, particularly for food and shelter. To tackle these issues, we conducted 74 projects in Sudan in 2022, primarily focusing on providing food aid, orphan care, and non-food assistance. More than 183 thousand people in need were able to benefit from our efforts.



Bangladesh

Bangladesh is one of the most densely populated countries in the world. Financial constraints, insufficient water sources, and climate conditions leave those in need in a difficult situation. Additionally, hundreds of thousands of Rohingya Muslims who fled Myanmar's massacres live in makeshift shelters they built themselves in Bangladesh. In 2022, we developed 94 projects for both Bangladeshi beneficiaries and Rohingyas, and we provided assistance to more than 195 thousand people.



HUMANITARIAN RELIEF

Millions of people around the world are struggling to survive due to war, natural disasters, disease, poverty, drought, and income inequality. As IHH, our aim is to fulfill the basic needs of individuals requiring humanitarian aid. Through our projects, we provide critical services to crisis-affected areas, including food, health, shelter, water, hygiene, education, and infrastructure construction. Additionally, we aim to help those in need by developing income-generating strategies. We respond to emergencies by performing search and rescue operations. We also implement special projects and construct orphanages to safeguard vulnerable orphaned children from harm.

Food Security and Livelihoods

In 2022, we were able to assist more than 6 million people in need through our food aid programs. In Turkiye alone, we have carried out 75 projects in the field of food security and livelihoods and provided humanitarian aid to 984 thousand people. Our food security projects consist of Qurbani shares, Ramadan food parcels, Iftar, general food aid, and cash aid.





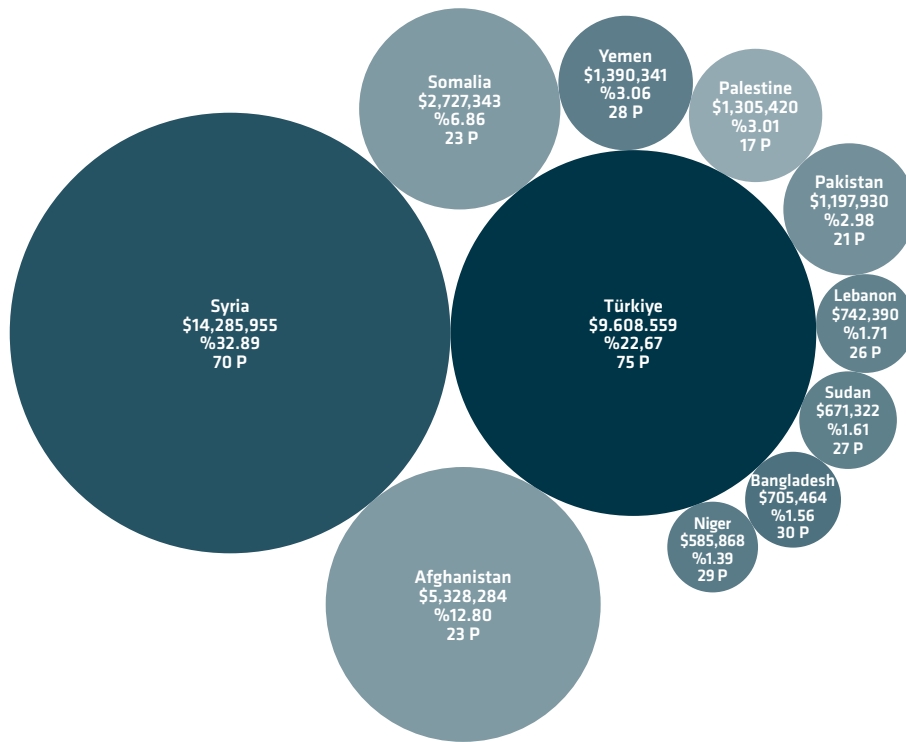

Ramadan and Eid al-Adha

With your support and donations, we reached out to 2 million 726 thousand people in 58 countries during Ramadan. We distributed 312,684 food parcels and shared Iftar meals with 380,690 people. We delivered your zakat, fitrah, and fidyah donations to 75,289 people in need.

During Eid al-Adha, we reached 60 countries. 2 million 631 thousand people in need benefited from 65,782 shares of Qurbani.



Seed Support to Farmers

Today, many countries are struggling to meet their own needs due to global warming and rising food prices. Especially in conflict and war zones, millions of people cannot access basic food supplies. This situation causes mass migrations.

As IHH, we provided seed support to farmers in Syria and Afghanistan who are struggling to engage in agricultural activities under difficult conditions. As part of our seed support program, we provided chickpea and wheat seeds in Syria and saffron seeds in Afghanistan in 2021. In 2022, we achieved the first harvest of the aid we provided. With the help of your donations, we aim to expand agricultural areas and empower individuals to be self-sufficient by growing their own crops.



Non-Food Items

In 2022, more than 1.3 million people around the world benefited from our Non-Food projects, including clothing, blankets, fuel and household items. We implemented 139 projects in 38 countries.





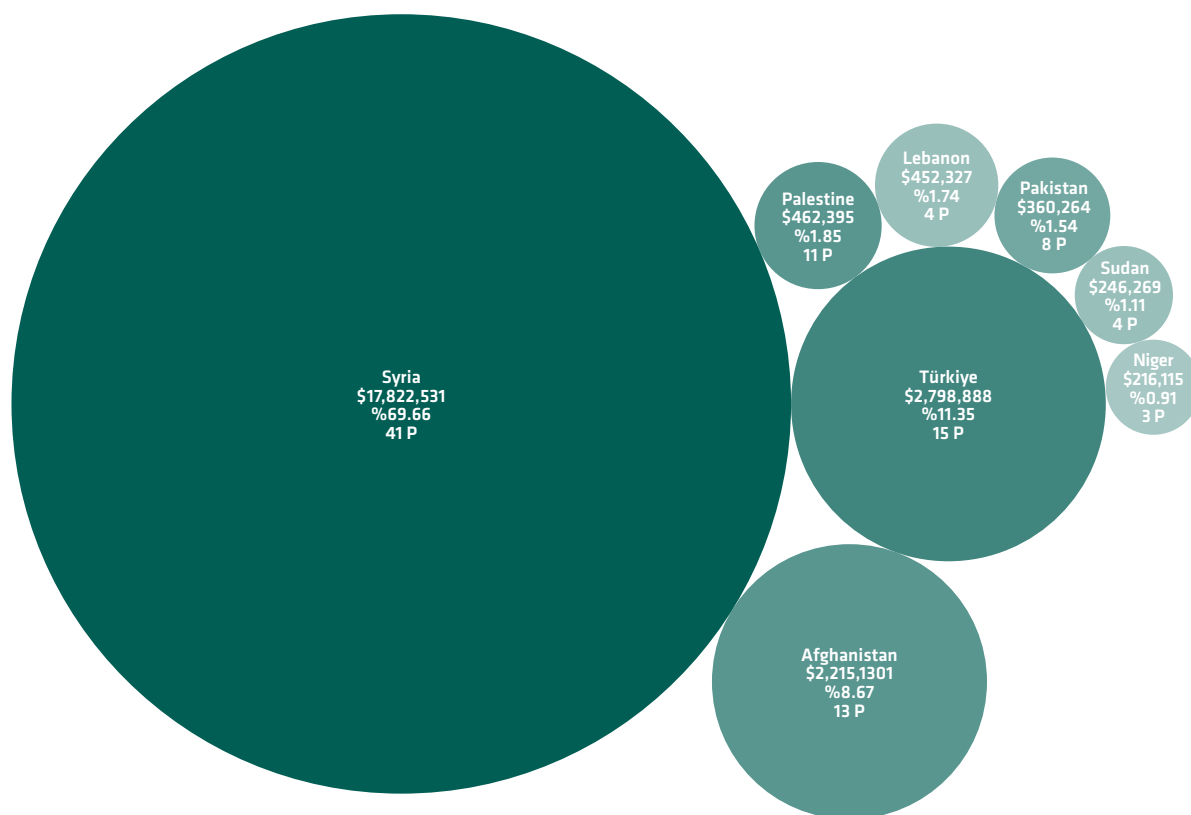

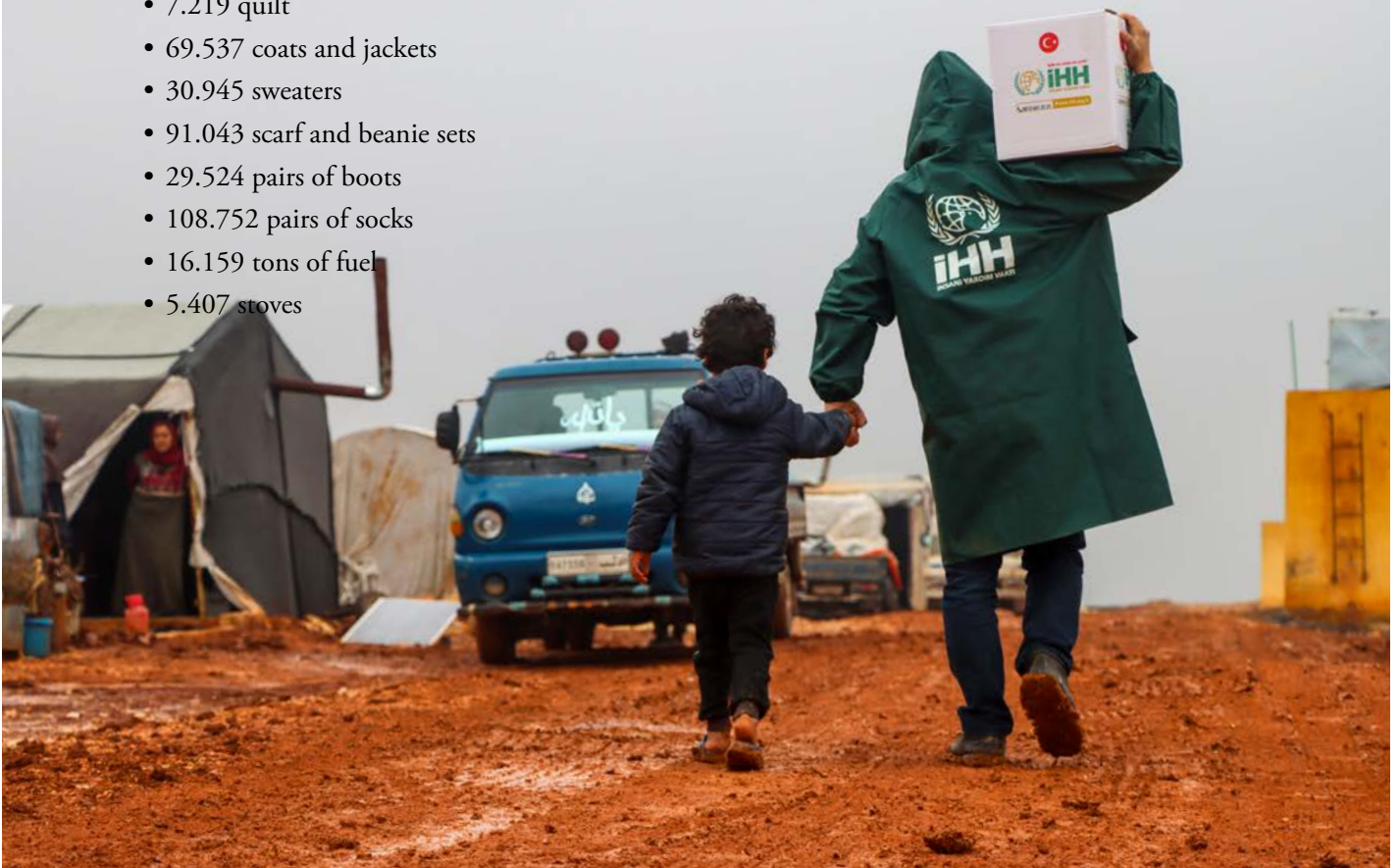
Syria Winter Aid

The war that started in Syria in 2011 has caused around 12.3 million people to flee their homes. Families forced to flee have been living in tents or makeshift shacks for years. The crisis worsens during the winter months, especially in tent cities where women and children constitute the majority. As the rains intensify, the camps fill with mud, and tents and belongings become unusable. Families cannot access food, boots, coats, blankets, stoves, and coal due to financial difficulties.

In 2022, IHH provided support to people in need in Syria by distributing a large number of materials, including winter clothes, blankets, stoves, and fuel, thanks to the contributions of its beneficiaries. Children were protected from the cold with items such as gloves, scarves, boots, and coats.

Main winter aids we delivered in 2022:

- 89.308 food parcels
- 2.595 tons of vegetables and fruits
- 5.807.080 bread
- 4.895 tons of flour
- 126,422 blankets
- 14.140 mattress and foam
- 7.219 quilt
- 69.537 coats and jackets
- 30.945 sweaters
- 91.043 scarf and beanie sets
- 29.524 pairs of boots
- 108.752 pairs of socks
- 16.159 tons of fuel
- 5.407 stoves



Afghanistan Goodness Train

The prolonged war of more than 40 years in Afghanistan has resulted in the country's devastation, making it challenging for its people to access basic food supplies. Approximately 13 million people in the country are facing poverty and hunger.

In an effort to assist the people of Afghanistan, 10 aid organizations joined together to create the "Goodness Train" which was coordinated by AFAD. The goodness train embarked on its first journey in February and completed its sixth trip in December.

The main aids we delivered to Afghanistan with the kindness train were:

- 39,500 nursery trees (apple, pear, quince, cherry, peach, pomegranate, apricot, date, walnut)
- 59,270 canned foods and food packages
- 535,455 kg of legumes (rice, kidney beans, chickpeas, beans) and pasta
- 1,000 tons of flour
- 150 tons of wheat
- 57,117 hygiene packages, patient and baby diapers
- 1,276 packages of baby food
- 7,362 toys and stationery sets
- 187,661 meters of fabric
- 110,032 pairs of shoes
- 204,070 clothing materials
- 17,426 blankets
- 6,933 carpets and rugs
- 203 tents and sleeping bags



Education

Our education projects include the construction or renovation of schools, dormitories, computer and chemistry laboratories, and gymnasiums; educational equipment support; the organization of vocational courses; and the printing and distribution of books and magazines. In 2022 alone, we implemented 142 projects. 66 thousand people in 36 countries benefited from our educational activities.





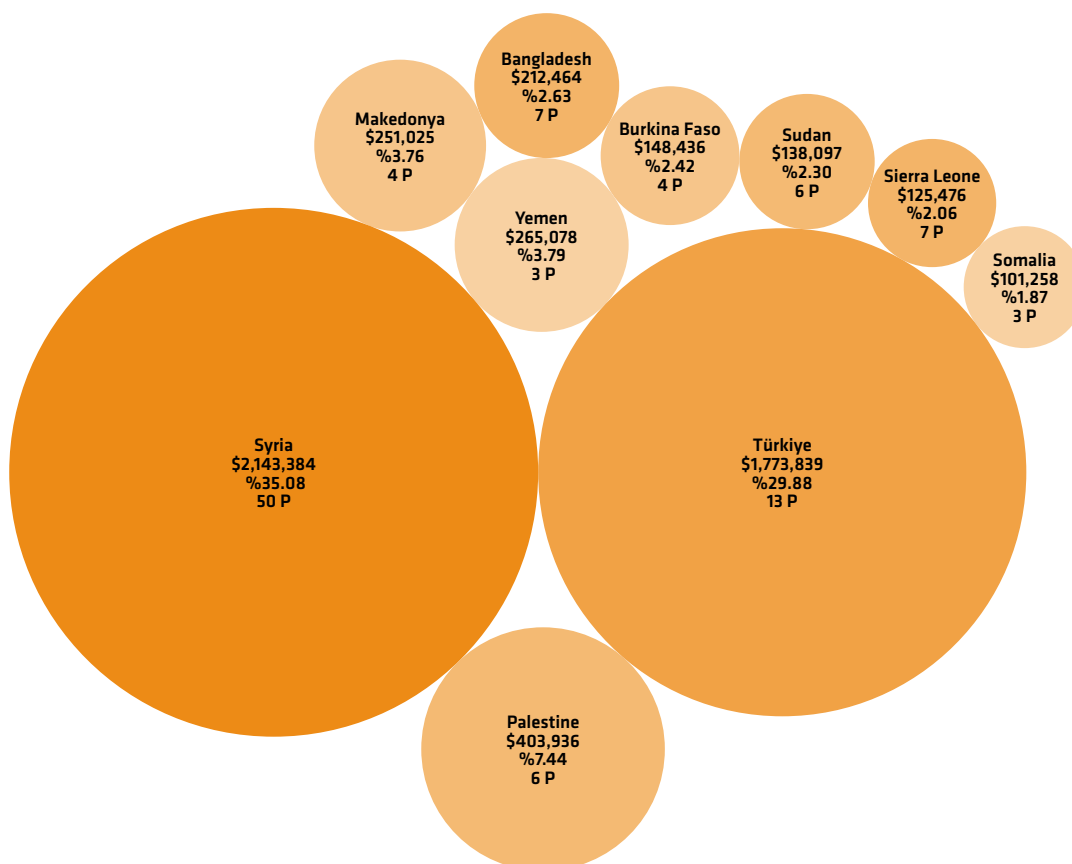

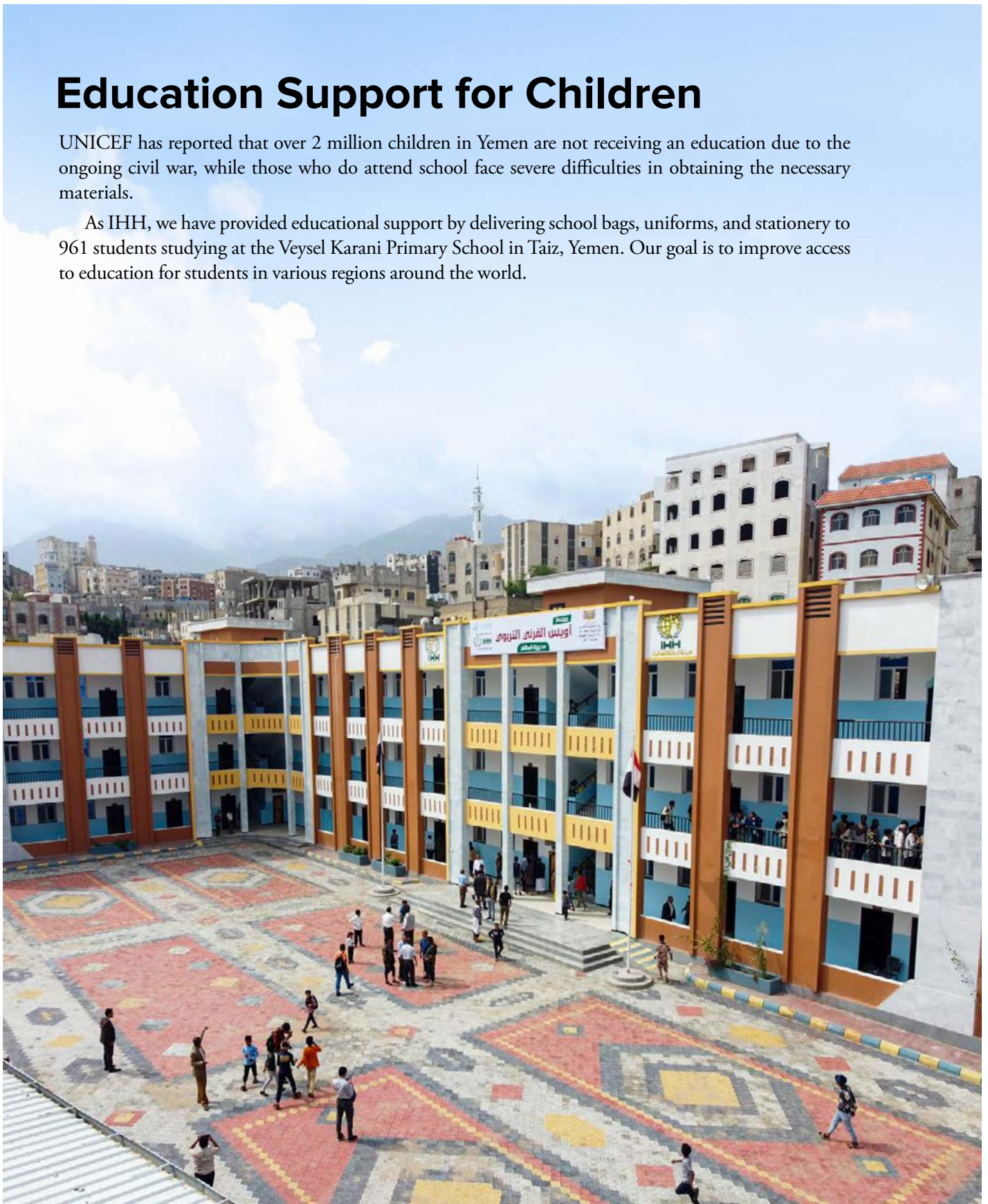

Education Support for Children

UNICEF has reported that over 2 million children in Yemen are not receiving an education due to the ongoing civil war, while those who do attend school face severe difficulties in obtaining the necessary materials.

As IHH, we have provided educational support by delivering school bags, uniforms, and stationery to 961 students studying at the Veysel Karani Primary School in Taiz, Yemen. Our goal is to improve access to education for students in various regions around the world.



Şule Yüksel Şenler Student Dormitory

As there is a shortage of student dormitories in North Macedonia, students are unable to meet their accommodation needs. To address this issue, IHH Foundation established the Şule Yüksel Şenler University Dormitory for Girls in Skopje, providing accommodation for 70 university students.

The project was made possible with the support of various organizations, including Rabve Foundation for Science and Service, Ensar Foundation, Bursa Metropolitan Municipality, Osmangazi Municipality, Üsküdar Municipality, and Eftinija Impex.



Protection

We carry out various activities in the field of protection, such as orphan sponsorships, building orphanages, and helping establish workplaces for orphan families. In 2022, we completed 481 projects and provided support to 229 thousand individuals. Furthermore, we continue to provide regular support to over 133 thousand orphans. Through our Orphan Sponsorship System, we aim to protect orphans and provide them with the necessary support to build their confidence and self-sufficiency. This system assures them that they are not alone, which allows them to live healthy lives as individuals.





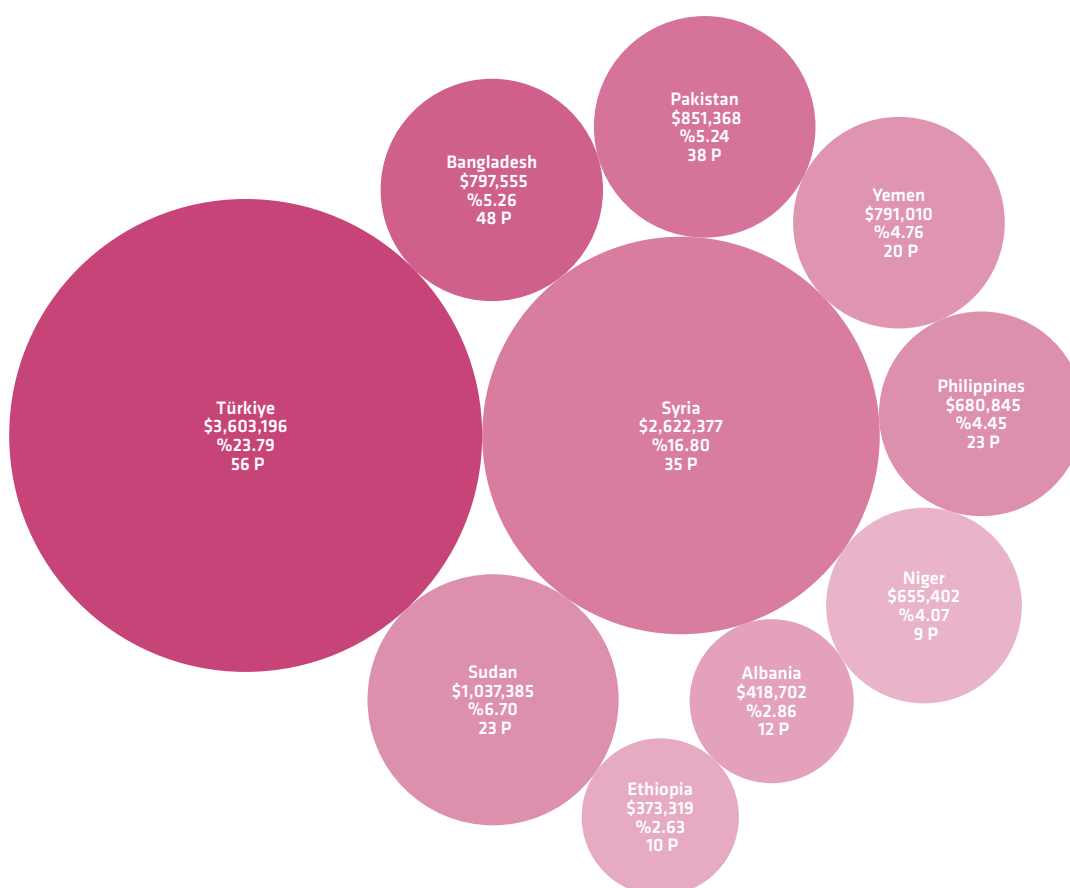

Dinç Family Orphan Education Complex

According to United Nations data, there are more than 150 million orphan children in the world. This number is increasing due to wars, natural disasters, and diseases.

We built the Dinç Family Orphan Education Complex in Niamey, the capital of Niger. With the complex, which will serve 120 orphans, we aim to meet the basic needs of the children as well as their social and mental development and to raise them in accordance with their cultural values. In addition, we meet the needs of all the people of the region with the school, mosque, and health center in our education complex.



Eid Clothing

In an effort to bring joy to orphans and children in need during Eid al-Fitr and Eid al-Adha, we provide them with holiday clothes each year. With the help of our donors, we were able to distribute Eid clothes to 122,446 children in 58 countries during Ramadan and 41,416 children in 14 countries during Eid al-Adha in 2022.



Health

Our foundation is engaged in a variety of health projects that aim to improve the healthcare systems in different countries. These projects include the construction and renovation of hospitals, clinics, health centers, and rehabilitation centers.

We also provide assistance in terms of medical equipment and medicines, health screening, vaccination campaigns, medical examinations, treatments, and surgeries. Moreover, we organize mass circumcision programs. In 2022, our health activities benefited over 524,000 individuals across 29 countries.

Furthermore, we launched a cataract campaign in 2007 with the support of philanthropists. Through this campaign, we have helped 173,000 individuals regain their sight. In 2022 alone, with your support, we were able to provide light to 16,693 people who were previously suffering from cataracts.






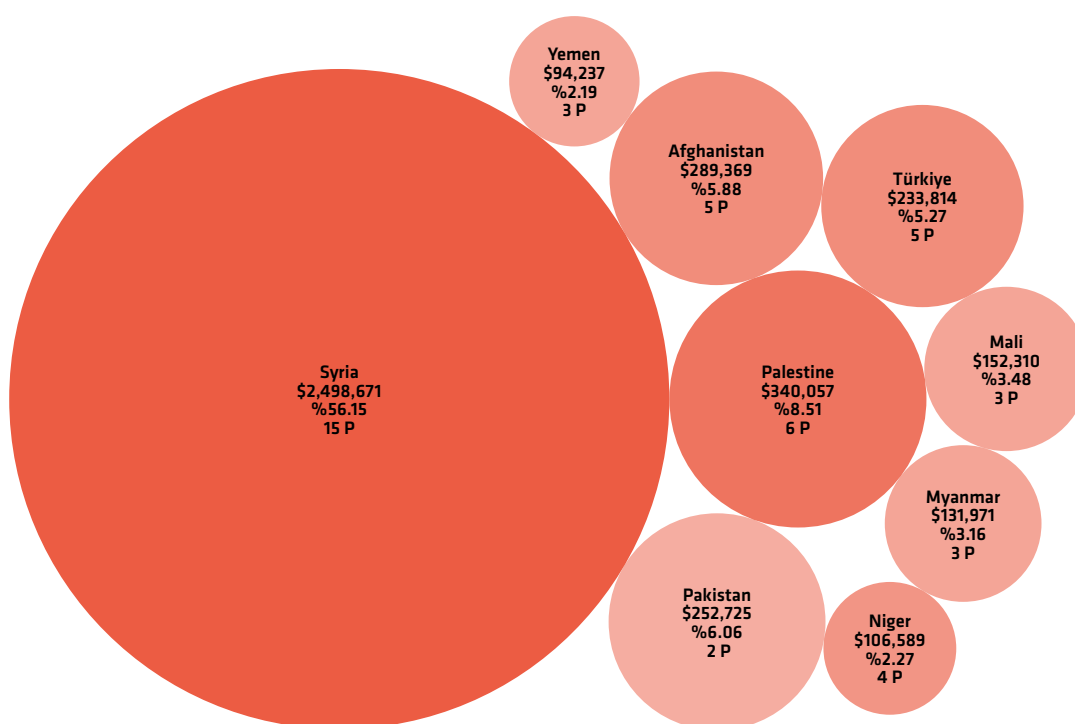

Health Care Support for Albinos

Due to superstitious beliefs in Africa, individuals with albinism may face discrimination and abandonment by their families, making it challenging for them to adapt to life and receive proper health care. Thus, they cannot adapt to life and cannot meet their health needs. People with albinism who cannot get regular examinations and cannot be protected from the sun with special clothes can lose their eyesight and develop skin cancer.

With the support of our donors, we gave 50 albinism patients in the Morogoro region of Tanzania long-sleeved clothes, sunglasses, hats, umbrellas, and special protective creams so that they could go out without being harmed by the sun.



Anti-Drug Hospital

The protracted war in Afghanistan has resulted in hundreds of thousands of people having limited access to essential healthcare services such as medical examinations and treatment.

In order to assist young Afghans struggling with drug addiction, our organization renovated the anti-drug hospital in the capital city of Kabul and provided shelter materials for 250 individuals. Our aim was to provide a healthier environment for rehabilitating young people to receive the necessary treatment.



Water, Sanitation and Hygiene

Our foundation has been working to combat drought and epidemics by drilling 12,533 water wells in 42 countries. Our water, sanitation, and hygiene projects include the construction of water wells and fountains, the opening and maintenance of water canals, and the distribution of hygiene kits. In 2022, we were able to provide aid to over 1.1 million people worldwide through our water, sanitation, and hygiene initiatives.





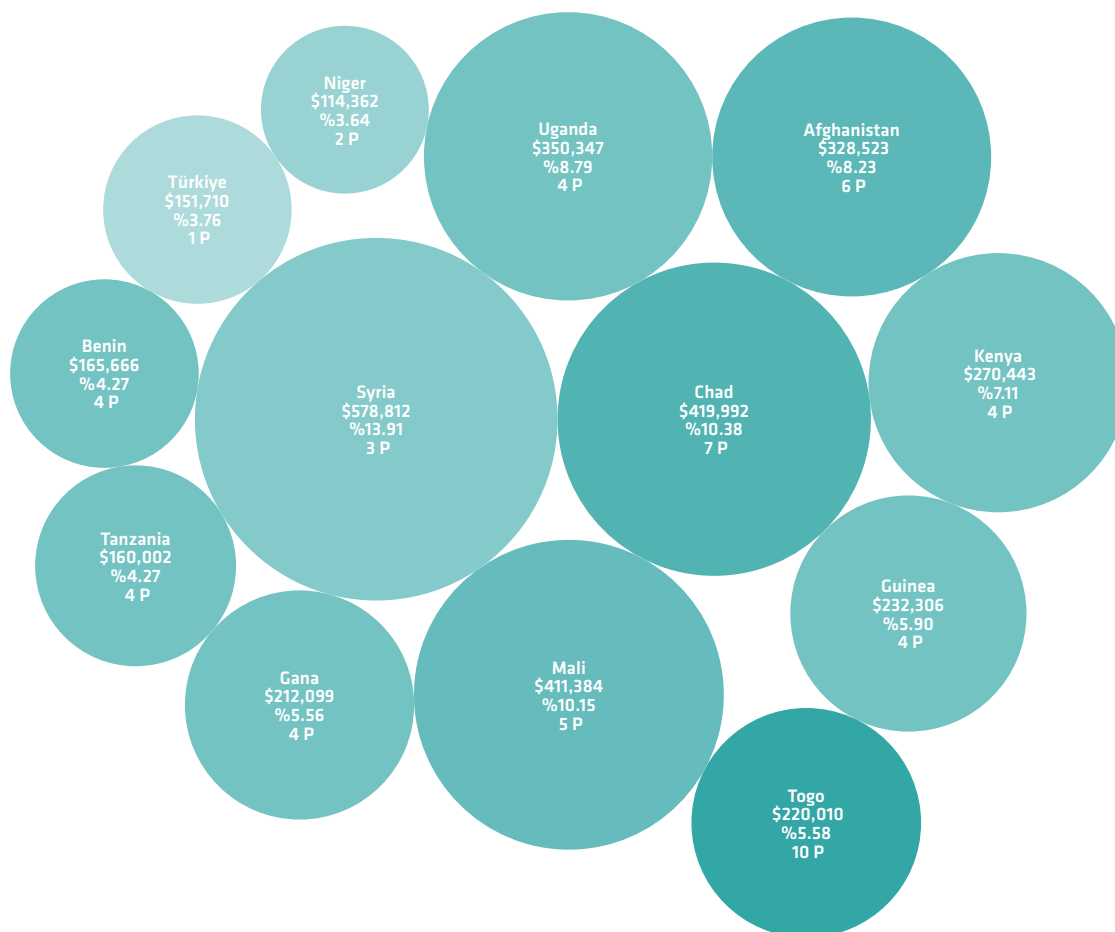

Water Wells

Clean water resources are depleting quickly around the world due to drought, irresponsible agricultural irrigation, and pollution. Approximately one-tenth of the global population is unable to obtain access to clean water, leading to thousands of deaths each day from diseases like cholera, diarrhea, and typhoid that are caused by contaminated water.

For the past 22 years, we have dedicated ourselves to assisting individuals worldwide who lack access to clean drinking water. Our primary focus is on drilling water wells in areas where the need is most acute. By doing so, we not only fulfill the people's basic requirement for safe and drinkable water, but also support animal husbandry and agricultural practices that rely on water resources.

Thanks to our donors' generosity, we were able to commission 1,375 water wells in 2022. With a total of 12,533 water wells completed in 42 countries thus far, we have provided clean water to millions of people in need.



Shelter

We undertake various shelter projects that involve building houses, providing rental aid, installing tents, and carrying out maintenance, repairs, and renovations to support those in need. Our efforts in the field of shelter resulted in 53 completed projects in 2022, which benefited over 101 thousand people in need.





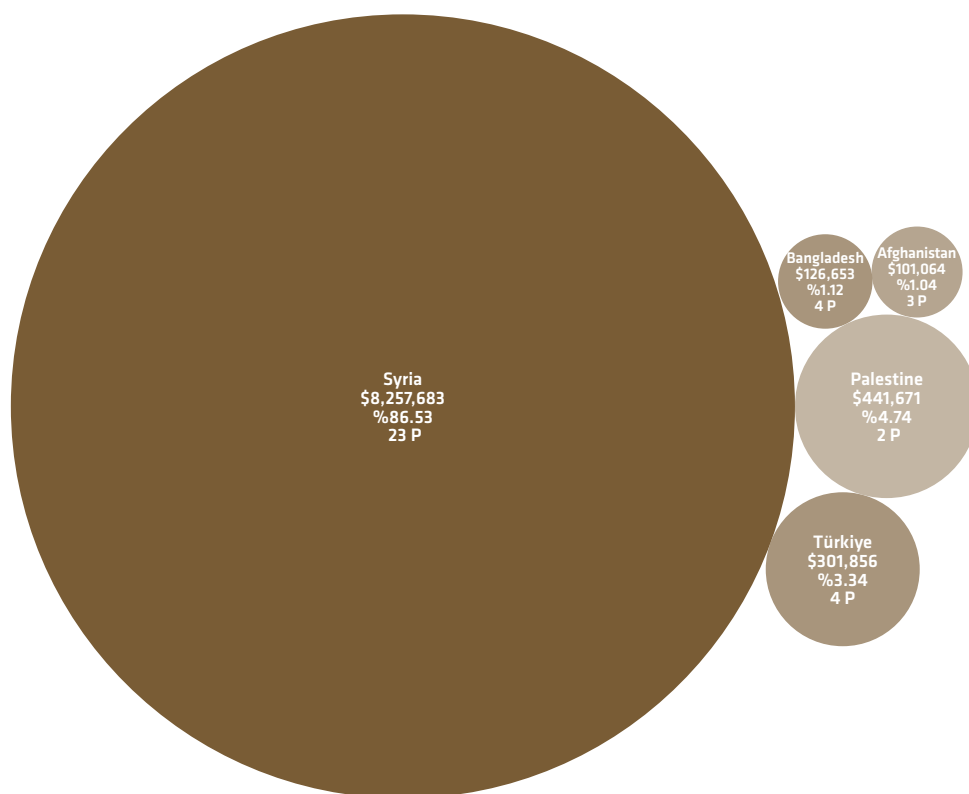

Reconstruction Project

Tens of thousands of houses in Palestine have been rendered uninhabitable by Israeli bombardments in 2021. While more than 30,000 houses were damaged in the Gaza Strip, which has been heavily affected by the ongoing attacks for years, 4,479 of these houses were completely destroyed, and 2,622 of them became unusable.

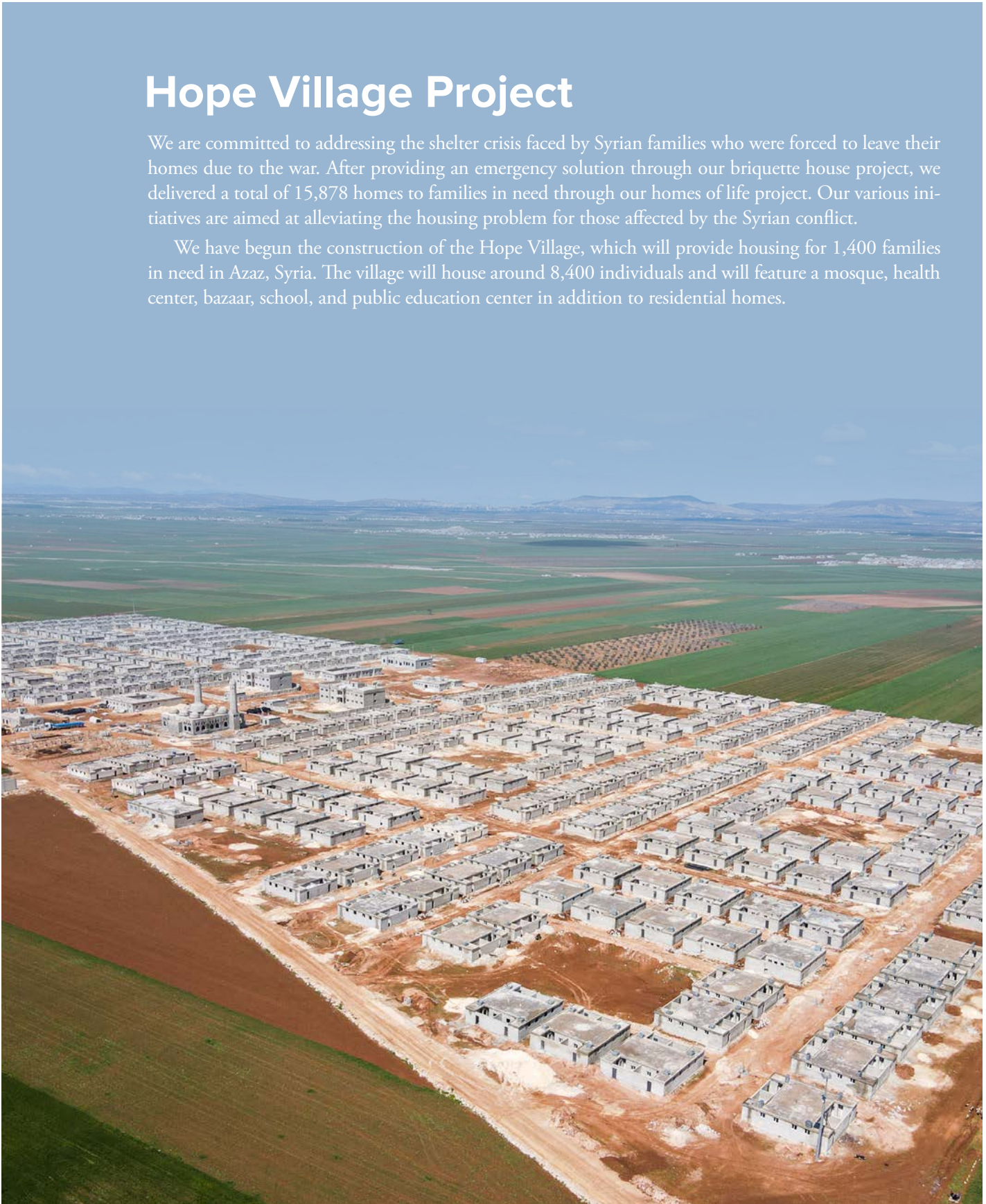
With our reconstruction project, we are renovating damaged houses and rebuilding demolished houses. While 33 houses have been delivered to those in need, with the completion of the project, we will reunite 100 families with their homes and meet the housing needs of approximately 500 people.



Hope Village Project

We are committed to addressing the shelter crisis faced by Syrian families who were forced to leave their homes due to the war. After providing an emergency solution through our briquette house project, we delivered a total of 15,878 homes to families in need through our homes of life project. Our various initiatives are aimed at alleviating the housing problem for those affected by the Syrian conflict.

We have begun the construction of the Hope Village, which will provide housing for 1,400 families in need in Azaz, Syria. The village will house around 8,400 individuals and will feature a mosque, health center, bazaar, school, and public education center in addition to residential homes.



Cultural

There are many regions across the world where people are unable to participate in cultural activities due to a lack of opportunities. In these areas, we strive to provide humanitarian aid to alleviate the needs of the people as well as conduct educational activities that enable them to remain connected to their religion and culture. In 2022, we were able to conduct 97 cultural projects in 19 countries, reaching a total of 221 thousand people through our initiatives.





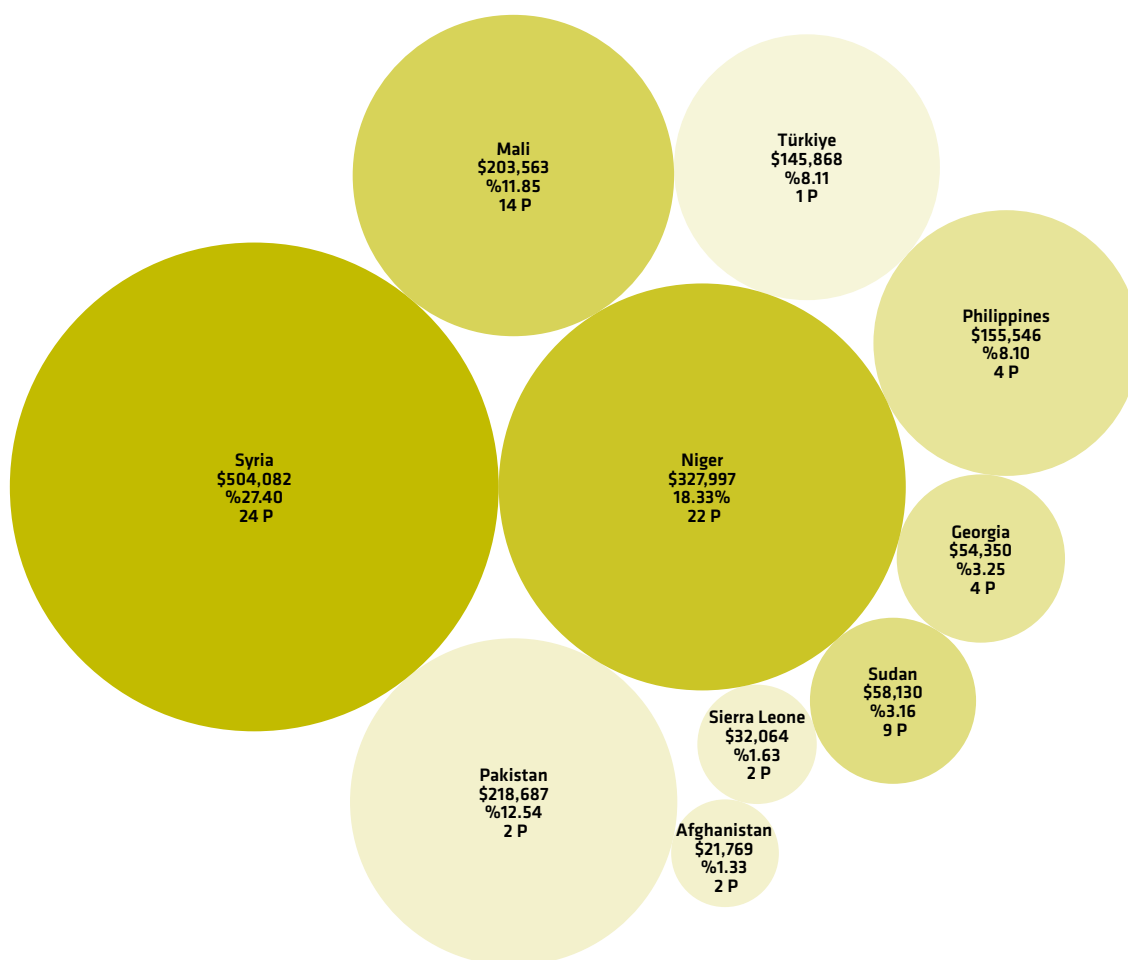

Disaster Management

Given that our country is situated in a geographically high-risk zone for disasters such as earthquakes, fires, and floods, we recognize the crucial importance of disaster management. As such, we are actively involved in various activities related to disaster management.

To ensure our search and rescue teams are competent in their operations, we provide them with a range of different training programs. We currently have 1 medium-class and 8 light-class teams accredited by AFAD's Urban Search and Rescue Accreditation System. In addition, IHH is the first NGO to be accredited as a heavy class in Nutrition Accreditation. We also collaborate with the Turkish Cooperation and Coordination Agency (TIKA) to offer training programs to search and rescue teams established in various countries.

In 2022, we realized 9 projects in 4 countries in the field of disaster management and touched thousands of lives.



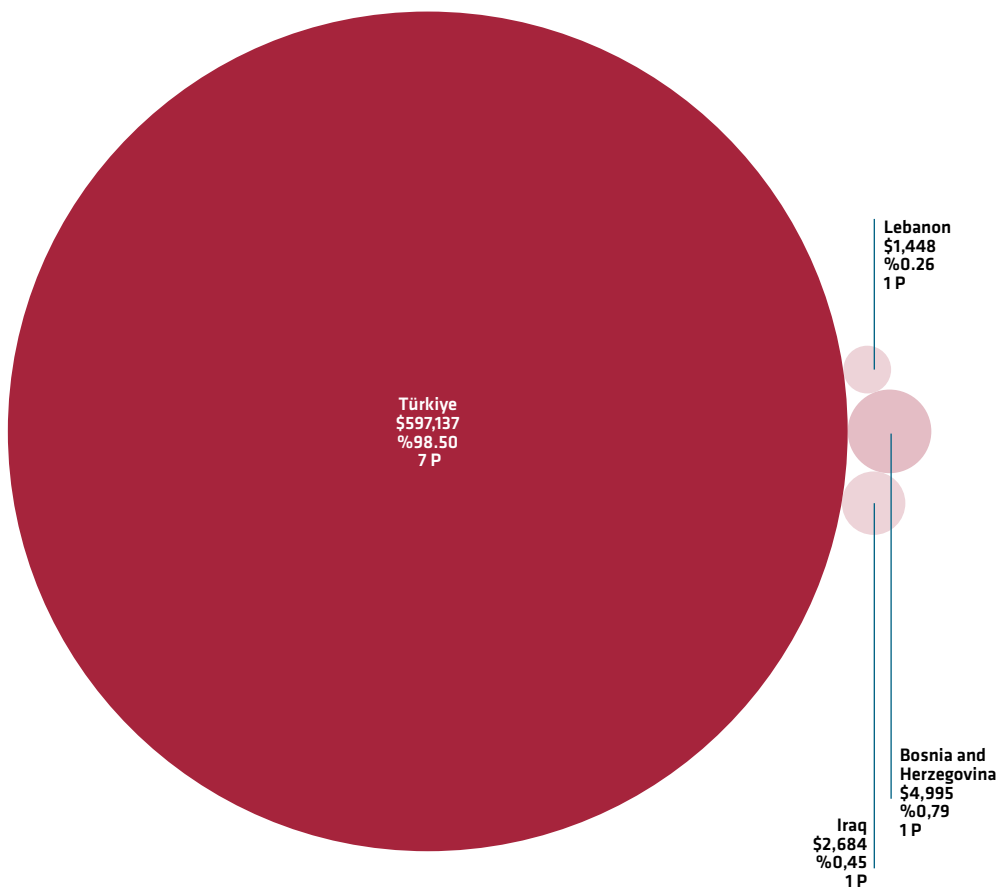


Countries by project, number of beneficiaries and amount of aid in the area of Disaster Management:

Search and Rescue

Our Disaster Management Department's search and rescue teams are responsible for responding to natural disasters such as earthquakes, fires, and floods both in Türkiye and worldwide, ultimately saving lives. These teams can provide first aid as well as search and rescue in debris, water, and fire. Established in 2009, our Search and Rescue Unit has taken part in many national and international operations.

In 2022, IHH Disaster Management Department organized a total of 138 visits, 137 meetings, 84 training sessions, 12 operations, 8 promotional activities, 7 drills, and 4 significant events related to important days and weeks.

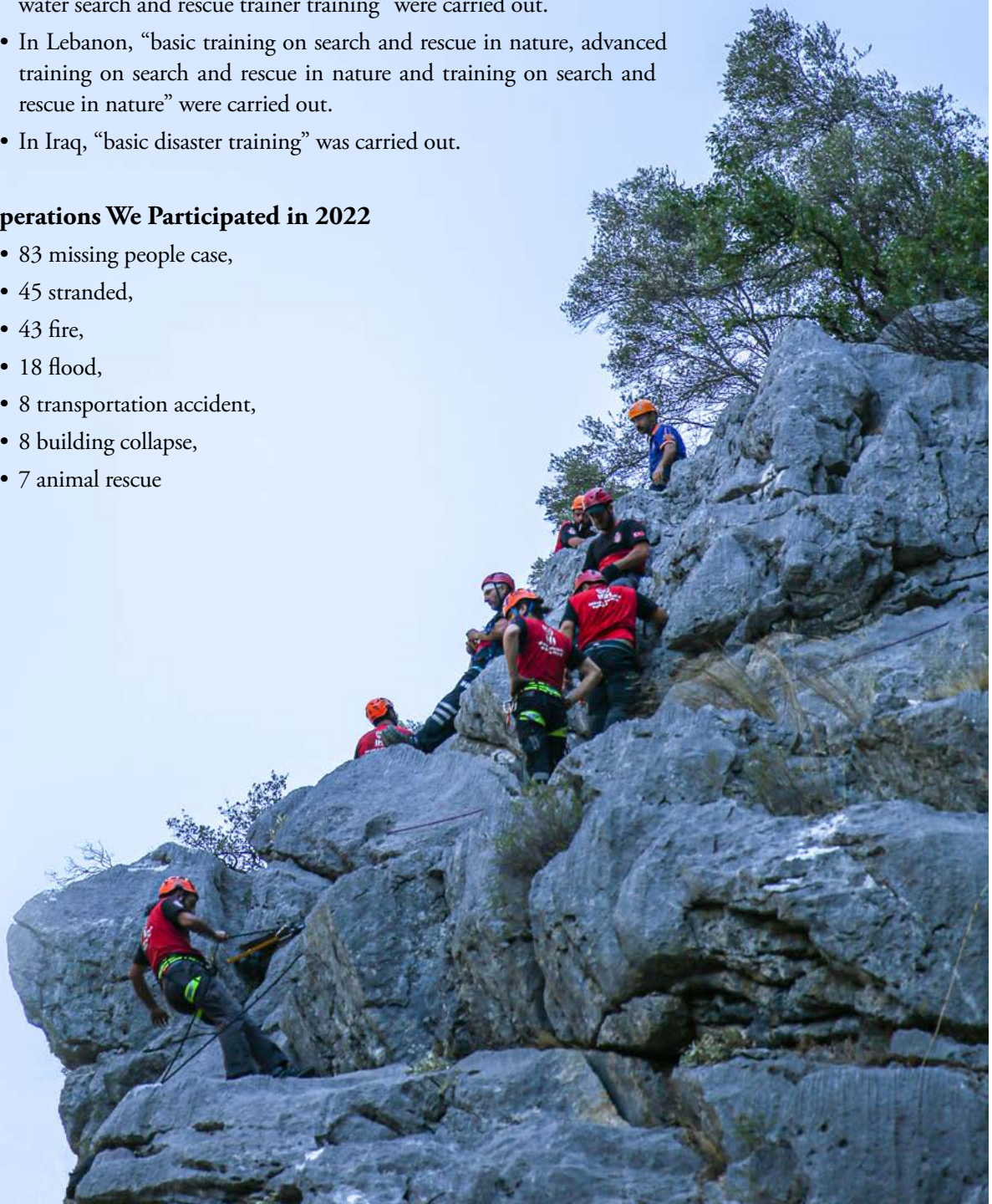

CONGRESSES AND CONFERENCES

2nd Balkan NGO Meeting

Our Foundation organized the “2nd Balkan NGO Meeting” in Skopje, the capital of North Macedonia. 60 participants from 29 civil society organizations operating in countries such as North Macedonia, Albania, Kosovo, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Serbia, Montenegro, Romania, and Türkiye came together for the “International Project Writing Training Certificate Program”. In the training program, lectures were given on R&D and innovation processes, SWOT analysis, project preparation techniques, applications to organizations providing project funds and grants, examination of sample project drafts, and a practical demo of project management stages.



International Council of Voluntary Organizations (ICVA) Annual Conference

As a member of the International Council of Voluntary Organizations, we participated in the ICVA's annual conference on climate, environment, and humanitarian aid, where we contributed to the exchange of ideas on how NGOs can adapt and develop methods to address these issues.

AWARENESS CAMPAIGNS

East Turkestan March

Protests were organized in 61 provinces on March 8, International Women's Day, in order to be the voice of East Turkistani women under the persecution of the Chinese government. International East Turkestan NGOs Union and East Turkestan Nuzugum Culture and Family Association also participated in the demonstration in Istanbul. After the march from Fatih Mosque to Saraçhane Park, a joint press statement was made. In the statement, many rights violations such as unjust and arbitrary arrest, imprisonment, torture and gang rape, forced abortion and sterilization, changing names with religious meaning, placing Chinese citizens in the homes of East Turkistani families under the name of “becoming a family project”, family breakdown and taking children from mothers, and the complete prohibition of cultural and faith-related activities were expressed in the camps.

“Say No to Discrimination!” Public Announcement

IHH Humanitarian Relief Foundation and International Refugee Rights Association issued a joint public statement against the increasing racist and discriminatory discourse against refugees and migrants. Information pollution and provocations, especially on social media, about refugees and migrants who had to migrate from their countries have turned into aggression. A public announcement was made for all segments of society to stay away from racist approaches and to be sensitive to protecting the lives and dignity of refugees.

INTERNATIONAL CALLS AND PRESS CONFERENCES

Press Conference for the Victims of the Fire in East Turkistan

IHH Humanitarian Relief Foundation, International Refugee Rights Association (UMHD) and International Union of East Turkistan Non-Governmental Organizations held a press conference for 44 people who died in a fire in a 21-story building in Urumqi, East Turkestan due to China's quarantine practice. Since 2016, between 1 and 3 million Uyghur Turks have been held captive in concentration camps. Due to restrictions under the name of China's "zero covid" policy, many people have been locked in their homes and left to die. 44 people died in a fire that broke out on November 24.

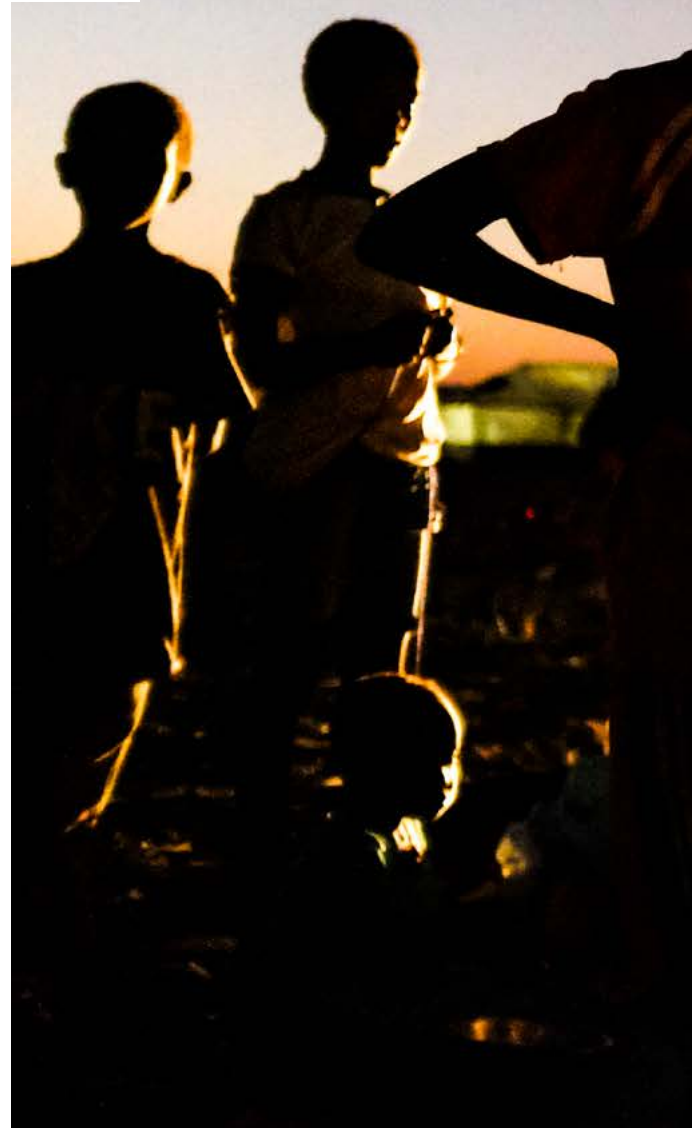
Mavi Marmara Panel

The Gaza Freedom Flotilla, consisting of the Mavi Marmara, Sfendoni, Challenger I, Eleftheri Mesogios, Gaza I, and Defne Y, which set out to bring humanitarian aid to Gaza and carried only aid volunteers and humanitarian aid supplies, faced an illegal attack and intervention by Israeli military forces in international waters on May 31, 2010. "Blessed Voyage: Mavi Marmara" was organized by civil society organizations at Istanbul Sabahattin Zaim University. The panel was attended by 12 speakers from academia and civil society organizations.



HUMANITARIAN DIPLOMACY AND INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS

As IHH, we conduct humanitarian diplomacy operations in areas affected by crises, conflicts, and natural calamities. Our primary objective is to safeguard civilians, locate missing individuals, release detainees, and resolve crises. We employ numerous official and diplomatic efforts to seek solutions in situations where human lives are in danger. We act as mediators when needed and eliminate barriers to humanitarian assistance. To enhance the effectiveness of our work in all these fields, we reinforce our connections both domestically and internationally. We also participate in several international forums related to humanitarian services, not just within our country and region.





HUMANITARIAN DIPLOMACY

Detainee And Hostage Freedom, Family Reunifications and Mediation

As IHH, we mediate between the conflicting parties in war and crisis areas; we also carry out humanitarian diplomacy efforts to save the lives of innocent people who are unlawfully arrested and taken hostage.

- We supported the return of 300 Iraqis who had to migrate from Iraq to Syria due to the conflicts.
- We supported the reunification of 10 families in Syria and Lebanon, 2 families in Ingushetia and 5 families in Azerbaijan.
- We supported two families from Azerbaijan and Ingushetia to reunite with their children in Syria.



TRAININGS AND ACTIVITIES WE PARTICIPATED IN 2022

Project Management Cycle Training in Humanitarian Aid, University of Geneva, Online

In order to manage project processes in a more effective and systematic manner in accordance with international standards, Project Management Cycle training was received from the Geneva Humanitarian Aid Center of the University of Geneva. In the programs held in April and May, with the main idea of addressing humanitarian needs holistically for an effective operation, the stages of project development and planning with the logical framework approach, budget preparation principles and monitoring/evaluation processes were carried out with practical activities. In 2023, we aim for all staff involved in projects to complete the training in stages.

UNHCR Data Tools Training, Istanbul

IHH Humanitarian Relief Foundation participated in the Knowledge Management Tools Training organized on September 28th for organizations that want to be involved in the Regional Refugee and Resilience Plan (3RP) coordination mechanism of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR).

In addition to the ActivityInfo tool, the training provided detailed information about Services Advisor, a mapping service that lists the services provided to refugees, and Kobo Toolbox, which allows humanitarian organizations to collect data safely and quickly, especially during fieldwork.

Sphere Training of Trainers, Istanbul

“Sphere Minimum Standards - Humanitarian Compact and Disaster Response Trainer Training” was delivered on October 10-14 by accredited Sphere Trainer and Sphere focal person Zeynep Sanduvaç to 19 of our staff who had already completed the Sphere “Humanitarian Compact and Minimum Standards in Humanitarian Assistance” training.

Leadership Training for Women NGO Managers, ICVA, Istanbul

The International Council of Voluntary Organizations (ICVA) provided “Leadership in Humanitarian Aid” training to women managers of non-governmental organizations, including IHH, between October 31 and November 3.

The training program aimed to improve the leadership knowledge and skills of women managers who are actively involved in humanitarian aid work in the Middle East and North Africa region. The training program covered topics such as basic concepts in humanitarian aid and leadership; women’s rights, roles and responsibilities in humanitarian leadership; advocacy and policy; influencing and leadership skills. In addition to IHH, 20 female officials from various non-governmental organizations operating in Egypt, Iraq, Jordan, Libya, Lebanon, Palestine, Syria and Türkiye participated in the training.

2022 AidEX The Global Humanitarian Aid Event, Brussels

IHH Humanitarian Relief Foundation took part in the 2022 AidEX held in Brussels, Belgium on November 16-17. This was the second consecutive year that IHH participated in the event. The fair is attended by over 2,500 members of the humanitarian aid and development community from more than 65 countries every year. During the event, IHH’s stand garnered the attention of international actors.

The Dubai International Humanitarian Aid & Development Conference and Exhibition (DIHAD), Dubai

On March 14-16, we participated in the 18th Dubai International Humanitarian Aid and Development Conference and Exhibition (DIHAD) in Dubai, United Arab Emirates. DIHAD exhibition is organized with the participation of humanitarian aid organizations, non-governmental organizations, international communities and companies that supply goods and services to these organizations and companies that want to become suppliers. Protocol meetings are held with the participation of the United Nations, European Union, Red Cross and Red Crescent organizations and government officials. More than 640 brands took part in the fair, which was attended by more than 6 thousand people from more than 80 countries.

Humanitarian Networks and Partnerships Week - UNOCHA, Geneva

Humanitarian Networking and Partnership Week (HNPW), organized annually by OCHA in Geneva, is one of the leading events in the humanitarian sector. It is an annual humanitarian conference that provides a space for collaboration for practitioners and experts from a wide range of humanitarian stakeholders, including UN agencies, NGOs, Red Crescent and Red Cross. This year, HNPW was held in a hybrid format in Geneva, Switzerland from May 2 to 20.

The event was organized on the recommendation of member states, humanitarian networks and partnership stakeholders to co-locate their annual meeting and provide an opportunity for professionals working in the humanitarian sector to exchange experiences, discuss new concepts, and introduce them. The aim is to connect and collaborate to find new tools, ideas, and solutions to common challenges in the field of crisis and response. As IHH Humanitarian Relief Foundation, we participated in HNPW's interactive networking sessions.

UN Global Platform for Disaster Risk Reduction (GP2022), Indonesia

The 7th session of the Platform (GP2022) was hosted by the Government of Indonesia and organized by the UN Office for Disaster Risk Reduction (UNDRR) in Bali, Indonesia, from May 23–28. The event was co-chaired by the Government of Indonesia and UNDRR.

As IHH Humanitarian Relief Foundation, we followed the latest developments and trends in knowledge sharing and disaster risk reduction at the platform's multi-stakeholder forum.

Geneva Humanitarian Hub, Geneva

The Geneva Humanitarian Aid Center, established by five NGOs under the leadership of ICVA, hosts more than 10 civil society organizations in Geneva. Geneva Humanitarian Aid Center, which is in active interaction with our Foundation, was visited regularly in 2022 and relations with civil society organizations there were improved.

Digital Memory Center

Digitalhafiza.com was created as a project with the aim of utilizing digital methods to educate and raise public awareness about the Palestinian issue. As part of the initiative, a publishing house has been established, and four books related to the topic have already been released. The project's future plans include developing game projects, virtual reality experiences, cartoons, and animations that tackle the Palestinian issue. The website provides access to a variety of written and visual resources about the issue.

IHH Humanitarian Relief Foundation is actively engaged in the provision of humanitarian aid through its professional units. A key aspect of this work is to enhance coordination and collaboration between these units, as well as other organizations, donors, and volunteers. To achieve this, IHH takes part in both national and international meetings, as well as attending training programs in Türkiye and overseas. For further details on the structure and activities of each unit, as well as developments that took place in 2022, please refer to the “Capacity Building” section.





COMPLIANCE AND RISK

IHH Humanitarian Relief Foundation ensures adherence to international and national laws in all its operations, including the procurement of donations, utilization of funds, and donor management. To safeguard and strengthen the foundation's reputation, both locally and internationally, comprehensive compliance efforts were initiated in 2017 and are still ongoing in 2022.

Compliance and Risk Unit in Brief

Contributes to the follow-up of work and transactions according to existing and to-be-established directives. Makes direct recommendations for improvement or regulation in business and transactions. Participates in commissions that are internal governance structures and supports decisions in accordance with the corporate culture.

Follows up on efforts to prevent any negativity that may occur in IHH's business and operations. Ensures the development of policies against money laundering, terrorist financing, bribery, and corruption.

Provides support for risk assessment and control activities. Monitors the activities of the Foundation and makes recommendations regarding risk and control activities. Tests the appropriateness and effectiveness of controls. Adapts the necessary checks and balances to minimize IHH's exposure to risk in all areas as much as possible.

Compliance and Risk Activities

The Compliance and Risk Unit is located in a central position within our foundation and operates under the guidance of the Compliance Committee. This committee consists of the Secretary General, the Compliance and Risk Officer, and the International Relations Coordinator. It undertakes various activities to ensure adherence to professional norms and standards, recognized business practices, internal standards, and ethical principles. It also focuses on maintaining ethical and legitimate practices throughout the foundation.

Compliance and Risk in 2022

In 2022, we also participated in the following organizations in order to improve compliance efforts:

Among other activities in which international standards are resolutely taken into account is the development of international programs and the activities carried out to make them more efficient with a monitoring and evaluation system. In order to make projects more efficient in every sense, to increase monitoring within the culture of cohesion, and to obtain healthy outputs, Compliance and Risk attach importance to and support international programming.

IHH ensures that all its operations, business transactions, and related activities are compliant with the regulations stated in the IHH Corporate Guide. The guide has been designed to ensure that all units operate in sync with their respective goals and objectives. It includes directives and guidelines for each unit to follow while performing their tasks, as well as relevant forms and instructions to facilitate the process.

The Compliance and Risk Unit tries to ensure that our Foundation's activities are in compliance with regulations and directives and that the language used by the Foundation is in line with the corporate culture. It also specializes in compliance and aims to monitor the Foundation's image in the international arena, conduct periodic compliance follow-ups, and support internal compliance. Basic compliance training is included in the orientation program. Monitoring tasks for donors and partners are carried out as primary tasks.

Compliance efforts are focused on establishing a culture that promotes ethical behavior in all circumstances, and they continue to play a pivotal role in this regard. In addition to identifying areas for improvement in business operations, Compliance now serves as a consultant for internal governance structures. This involves sorting incoming tasks and transitioning from a primarily monitoring role to a more advisory role, where Compliance and Risk provide guidance and signals to enhance overall compliance.

Corporate compliance ambassadors are an integral part of our training and awareness program, where we encourage suggestions and feedback to promote our corporate culture. We continuously engage in risk management planning to enhance compliance with our policies and regulations. Our "Notification and Speaking Up Culture" policy ensures a fair and ethical environment through a culture of transparency and openness, where employees are encouraged to speak up without fear of retaliation.

Internal legislation development activities have been implemented within the scope of reviewing the documents in IHH's hierarchy of norms and completing the deficiencies. IHH's policies, guidelines, regulations, and directives were handled with a compliance perspective and risk analysis approach, and improvements were made by taking into account national legislation and international standards.

AUDIT

Audit

Our Foundation evaluates risk management, control, and corporate governance processes in order to achieve the goals it has set in line with its founding purpose. We carry out audit and consulting activities to improve and develop all these processes.

Internal Audit

The internal audit of IHH Humanitarian Relief Foundation within the scope of the relevant law is carried out by the Audit Board, elected among the members of the Board of Trustees. Internal audits are conducted every year, and the Internal Audit Report (Annex-7) is submitted to the General Directorate of Foundations.

In addition to the Audit Board, IHH has also established an Internal Audit Unit. The Internal Audit Unit carries out its duties in accordance with the working procedures and principles in the Internal Audit Standards published by the Internal Audit Coordination Board. In the Foundation's headquarters, branches, and representative offices, as well as domestic and international activities, internal systems and methods are audited to ensure that they are implemented in accordance with the procedures and principles arising from the law in order to increase efficiency. It also provides consulting services for information and opinion requests by the Board of Directors or relevant units. It reports the internal audit work carried out to ensure the continuity of the system, to eliminate system deficiencies and to develop it according to new needs, to improve its functioning, to protect assets, to investigate damages caused or possible damages, and to prevent risks, and submits them to the supervisory board and the secretary general.

ISO Quality Management Audits

ISO 27001: Our Foundation develops systems for continuous compliance with the Personal Data Protection Law. At the end of 2018, it received the certificate of compliance with the "ISO/IEC 27001 Information Security Management System" standard by making the International Information Security Management System sustainable within the organization. Compliance audits are conducted regularly every year by the Internal Audit Unit. After internal audits are completed, external audits are carried out by authorized audit firms for certificate license renewal and compliance.

ISO 37001: With the “ISO/IEC 37001 Anti-Corruption Management System”, our Foundation sets the requirements and provides guidance for a management system designed to help prevent, detect and respond to corruption and to help the organization comply with anti-corruption laws and voluntary commitments that apply to its activities. Compliance audits are conducted annually by the Internal Audit Unit. After internal audits are completed, external audits are conducted by authorized audit firms for certificate license renewal and compliance.

Internal Control

The Internal Control Unit is authorized by the Board of Directors. While auditing the compliance of the Foundation’s activities with laws and regulations, it aims to ensure that resources are used appropriately, economically, and efficiently. It aims to ensure the reliability, integrity, and timely availability of personal and corporate information.

The Foundation’s activities are recorded and processes are monitored through the Sistem Plus ERP system used, and digital archives and filings are made on the system. In projects and assignments, the Internal Control Unit performs separate transaction controls at the initial request stage and at the final file closure, ensuring instant process follow-up. A total of 13,898 transactions in the categories of projects, assignments, procurement, and aid applications received by our unit during the year were controlled internally.

Project Control: To ensure compliance, we conduct regular checks such as entering project information into our system, defining appropriate budgets, ensuring complete entry of information if collaborating with a partner, adhering to foundation regulations for project implementation, and creating interim, progress, and final reports. Additionally, we include project implementation documents and visuals in our checks. In 2022, we conducted internal reviews of 2,193 project files, consisting of 1,372 project request files and 821 project closing files.

Assignments: For projects and activities approved by our Board of Directors, we conduct checks to ensure that the content, expenditure documents, mission reports, archive layout, compliance with relevant legislation, and purpose of the assignments align with our standards. In 2022, we internally reviewed 7,037 assignment files, including 3,648 assignment request files and 3,389 assignment closing process files, to ensure compliance.

Purchases: With the approval of the Board of Directors, the purchase requests for projects and activities were checked in terms of content and documents. In 2022, 1,459 purchase requests were internally controlled.

Aids: The application records and relevant documents of individuals and organizations applying for aid were examined and checked for compliance. In 2022, 3,209 requests for aid application files were checked internally.

AUDIT

Field Inspections

The Support Audit Unit is responsible for conducting audits to ensure that technical drawings and plans align with the project requirements for permanent work projects approved by our Foundation. The adequacy of the materials and equipment to be used in permanent monument projects for the project and whether the country, region, geographical, and demographic structure of the project is suitable for the implementation of the project are evaluated. Furthermore, they conduct audits to evaluate the compliance, appropriateness, and efficiency of completed permanent work projects.

In 2022, the Support Audit Unit audited 87 permanent work projects planned for realization in 10 different countries, including ongoing projects and those completed in previous years. They also provided support to the relevant unit by conducting field inspections for water well projects. Additionally, experts and institutions, such as architects and engineers, were consulted when necessary for project implementation and inspections.

Independent Audit

It is aimed at examining the financial statements based on accounting, documents, and records in accordance with the auditing principles and rules and reporting whether the financial statements comply with generally accepted accounting principles and standards and whether the information presented is true and accurate.

Our Foundation and its subsidiaries have been audited annually since 2014 by an internationally accredited independent audit firm. Independent Audit Reports are published on our Foundation's ihh.org.tr corporate website and shared with the public.

Tax Exemption Audit (Attestation Report)

Our Foundation has gained "Tax Exemption Status" with the decision of the Council of Ministers dated April 4, 2011 and numbered 2011/1799, and is audited by Certified Public Accountants every year, including the 2011 calendar year, to determine whether it maintains these conditions. The prepared audit report is forwarded to the Revenue Administration, published on our Foundation's ihh.org.tr corporate website, and shared with the public.

Other Audits

In activity-based or permanent structure projects, audits are carried out by staff, volunteers, and experts assigned by the Foundation's Board of Directors. Donors are provided with a detailed closing report on their projects. Periodically, with the approval of the Board of Directors, donors who provide project funding are given the opportunity to participate in field activities and inauguration programs for permanent works if they meet certain criteria. In the name of accountability, transparency, and public disclosure, monitoring and evaluation studies of projects and activities are carried out with the participation of delegations consisting of people from public or private institutions, members of the press, and people from different fields.

DATA MANAGEMENT

Data Management Unit leverages the data owned by the IHH Humanitarian Relief Foundation to contribute to the preparation of statistics and reports that align with international standards. By processing this data, they assist with project planning. The Unit conducts various studies related to data management, including developing the data warehouse, preparing dashboards for foundation units, and conducting donor segmentation.

Activities in 2022

- In 2022, improvements were made to the data management system; general financial and unit-specific reports were switched to systems that can be analyzed and visualized.
- A budget planning portal was built for tracking the Foundation's budget planning and was put into practice in September 2022.
- Donor analysis studies were conducted, and contributions were made to the 2022 Sacrifice and Ramadan campaigns.
- Data sets for general activity reports and the Syria Activity Report were prepared.
- A Data Management Unit Directive was prepared within the scope of internal legislation.
- In order to make the data reporting and analysis work of the unit staff more effective and faster, the unit staff participated in trainings covering the relevant BI tools, coding languages, and effective data management procedures.

Conferences and Workshops

- We participated in the Digital Marketing World Forum (DMWF) event held in London on June 23-24.
- On October 27-28, we participated in the online workshop titled "Eastern Europe and Central Asia Regional Workshop on Data Protection and The Impact of Technologies and AI on Human Rights".

EDUCATION

Education Unit aims to provide training to IHH Humanitarian Relief Foundation's staff and volunteers across Türkiye in line with the Foundation's mission, vision, and values. It organizes in-service training in this direction.

ORGANIZATION

The Organization Unit ensures the functioning and coordination of IHH Humanitarian Relief Foundation's branches across Türkiye and the humanitarian aid associations it works with as partners within the framework of certain protocols. It also carries out the necessary work with branches and partner organizations to meet the needs of those in need in Türkiye and in different geographies around the world.

Activities in 2022

- Work was carried out to renew the IT equipment that the unit staff constantly needs in the field.
- Partner project desks and secretariat desks were merged to form the Humanitarian Aid Association and Branch Coordination Unit.
- The report format used by our provincial representative offices was changed.
- Organization Information System (OIS) development work started.
- The regional office working system was started. In 2022, the number of volunteers at our Foundation reached 92,212.

SECURITY

The Security Unit ensures that the necessary security measures are taken in the buildings, warehouses, and working areas of the organizations under the responsibility of IHH Humanitarian Relief Foundation. It makes the necessary installations for this purpose. It monitors the travel safety of our volunteers and staff during their international and domestic missions.

Activities in 2022

- Efforts were made to digitalize international security and travel security activities.
- Planned and unplanned visits and inspections were made to the locations where our private security personnel are located.
- The number of locations in our security systems was increased, and technological updates were made.

DIGITAL PLATFORM AND PUBLICATIONS MANAGEMENT

In 2022, the unit structure of the Publications Unit was divided into sub-specialties and organized as Digital Platform and Publications Management. The unit ensures that the Foundation's printed and digital publications are produced and included in the fundraising process, the management of the website and mobile applications, photography, archiving, digital advertising, and other responsibilities are carried out in a complete manner. The unit continues to improve itself in all areas in order to increase the quality of the work produced, generate new ideas, and contribute more to the Foundation's vision.

The unit is divided into Publications, Digital Funding and Photo Archive.

Publications

The Publications Department organizes and produces all printed content of the Foundation in Turkish and other languages. These publications can sometimes be used in a representative office and sometimes at a fair abroad.

The main activities of the Publications Department are as follows:

- At the end of the year, it prepares the annual activity report to evaluate the Foundation's year and makes it ready for publication.
- Evaluates the request for brochures or booklets to be prepared within the unit or received from another unit, sets a timetable, and prepares them for publication.
- Prepares and publishes the quarterly Humanitarian Aid Magazine.

Digital Funding

The digital funding department works with a 360-degree communication strategy and adapts digital platforms to the Foundation's structure. These include Google Ads, SEO, mailing, re-marketing, notification, mobile application, SMS, and other methods. The main purpose of the Digital Funding department is to explain the Foundation's projects to donors in the most effective way and to fund the projects.

The main tasks of the Digital Funding department are as follows:

- Ensuring that the content produced for interconnected digital platforms such as mail, notifications, and websites are compatible with each other.
- Working in harmony with the relevant Foundation units to determine which projects need to be funded on digital platforms.
- To renew the Foundation's website periodically, taking into account user experiences.
- Conducting SEO work to make the Foundation's website stand out in search engines.
- To advertise the campaigns and content published on the website in digital media when deemed necessary.

Photo Archive

The Photo Archive department undertakes the tasks of producing, documenting, and archiving. When necessary, it provides training to Foundation staff and volunteers on more effective photo production, the Foundation's vision of photography, and issues to be considered.

The main tasks of the Photo Archive department are as follows:

- It selects the photographs delivered by the Digital Platform and Publication Management Unit in detail. It makes light and color arrangements of the selected photographs and categorizes them.
- The photo file is divided into two parts: edited and raw images. Raw images are uploaded to the raw archive, while edited and named images are uploaded to the archiving program for use by the relevant people.
- It finds the requested photographs in the archiving program and delivers them to the requesting person.

The programs we participated in

Digital Marketing World Forum (DMWF), London

On June 23–24, the Digital Marketing World Forum (DMWF) was held in London, England. In the digital marketing forum, expert speakers presented more than 100 programs. We also had the opportunity to meet with more than 50 companies providing services in this field. We contacted some of these companies and tested the tools that we could use for the benefit of IHH. After returning home, we continued to conduct online interviews. We continue to integrate the tools we think are appropriate into our digital marketing structure.

MEDIA AND SOCIAL MEDIA

Media and Social Media Unit is in charge of promoting and disseminating the IHH Humanitarian Relief Foundation's digital content on various media platforms and social media sites. The unit actively generates innovative ideas, stays updated on current trends, conducts research, and assesses the suitability of these ideas for the foundation. Furthermore, the unit actively participates in implementing these ideas. Its main activities involve producing and sharing content such as news articles, advertisements, announcements, reports, videos, clips, and photographs, aligning them with the foundation's mission and vision, and ensuring they go through the necessary approval processes before reaching the public.

The following activities are carried out within the unit under the main headings:

News text writing, photo shooting, video shooting, news service, advertising planning, corporate relations with media institutions, news monitoring, legal news monitoring, YouTube content production, social media management, content production for social media, press conference organization, and live broadcast planning and implementation.

The unit is divided into Media, Advertising, Social media, and Content Production.

Media

The media department is primarily responsible for conducting research to locate, verify, and translate the content that the foundation intends to report. This content is then transformed into news articles and distributed to both national and international media outlets and organizations. The same news articles are also uploaded to the foundation's official website. In certain cases, the department may also create accompanying photos and videos for the news articles, typically obtained from other relevant units within the foundation, which are organized using news techniques before being distributed through a mailing service. From time to time, the news articles are also shared on the foundation's social media accounts.

The main fields of activity of the media department are as follows:

- Press conference organization
- Monitoring and reporting of news content about IHH in the media
- Legal news monitoring
- Photographing and reporting official visitors to the Foundation
- Participating in important international or domestic activities in person
- Ensuring the participation of members of the media in important activities of the Foundation abroad or in Türkiye

Advertisement

The advertising department plans, organizes, and implements the foundation's advertisements in newspapers, radio, TV, and websites. The main fields of activity of the advertising department are as follows:

- Appropriate price research according to market conditions

- Strategic advertising planning considering time and medium
- Ensuring, developing, and managing communication with advertisers and the agencies that mediate this communication for the benefit of the foundation
- Payment follow-up for advertising expenditures

Social Media

The Social Media department is responsible for managing the organization's corporate social media accounts. They develop a plan for sharing the content produced both within and outside the department at the appropriate time and through the appropriate medium. The main areas of activity of the Social Media department are as follows:

- Corporate account management
- Graphic design application and production of variations
- Legal social media content monitoring
- Planning and implementation of post shares

Content Production

The Content Production department produces and implements special content targeted to be featured in the media or on social media. Its main area of responsibility is the planning of the Foundation's YouTube Channel and live broadcasts. The main areas of activity of the Content Production department are as follows:

- YouTube Channel management
- Research and implementation of special contents planned to be produced by the unit
- Planning of live broadcast organizations to be performed on the Foundation's social media accounts, organization of the Foundation's components, and realization of the broadcast
- Story and content research to share on the foundation's related organs, especially YouTube
- Execution of the editing and assembly process of the content to be shared on the YouTube Channel and other social media
